You've heard the sayings: There can be no life without change. Intelligence is the ability to adapt to change. Adapt or perish. Heard often enough, they begin to sound like fodder for softfocus inspirational posters or banal quote pictures shared on social media. But, for better or worse, the sayings hold true. Whenever the wind changes direction, you'd better adjust your sails.

Who knows this better than an independent media producer in the year 2019? These are turbulent times for our industry: an ever-multiplying array of distribution platforms, flat or decreased funding, increasingly blurred lines between film and TV, the fading relevance of the traditional box office as a metric by which to judge a film's success.

And yet, independent producers keep rising to every challenge. In our cover story, "The Incredible Adapting Act" (page 4), we look at the enduring popularity of film adaptations of books, plays, shows and more. We examine the challenges inherent to adaptations, alongside an exploration of an even more impressive adaptation: that of a producer to a filmmaking reality that includes squeezed budgets. a battle for theatrical release, and other hurdles. In "The Virtual Vanguard" (page 14), we hear from creators who are diving headfirst into the brave new world of cinematic VR. For those of us to whom virtual reality still seems like a futuristic daydream, it's an exciting glimpse into the opportunities available to producers when they embrace burgeoning new technology.

With a federal election on the horizon, we're reminded that our political circumstances are also subject to change. In this issue, we're including a handy guide to the top issues facing Canada's production sector today ("Indie Producers Vote," page 26). Reach out to your local candidates to let them know the importance of our sector—in terms of GDP and high-quality jobs—and how they can help ensure it continues to thrive well past election day. The CMPA is committed to nothing less, and we encourage you to add your voice to ours.

In "What the BTLR Heard" (page 28), a report from the legislative frontlines, we look at what the Broadcasting and Telecommunications Legislative Review (BTLR) Panel heard from stakeholders during nationwide consultations. We lay out some themes from the panel's interim report—equitable treatment of all players, a need for ISPs to contribute to the creation of content, the importance of an independent production sector to preserve a diversity of voices—and how new legislation can best address them. We look forward to the panel's final report, due in January.

While change is inevitable, it's also the case that the more things change, the more they stay the same. It's certainly the case with the CMPA's BC Producers Branch, which celebrates its 25th anniversary this year. British Columbia's production sector has experienced tremendous change and explosive growth in that time, but our retrospective on page 34 reveals that CMPA-BC has been an innovative force (with foresight to spare) all along. It's a trend that continues even now. Congratulations, CMPA-BC! We can't wait to see what the next 25 years will bring.

In this issue, we also check on the progress of the #MeToo movement (page 30). Three women with intimate knowledge of the industry—director April Mullen, actor and Reelworld founder Tonya Williams, and Karen Bruce of Women in Film and Television—share their personal takes on how far we've come since 2017, and where work still needs to be done to make our industry a safe and equitable working environment for all. The piece is a reminder that sometimes change can't happen fast enough.

Whatever pace it arrives at, change is bound to shape both the industry and our approach to it. I believe that producers' ability to create and retain strong IP remains their strongest rudder through every storm. I also believe that our members have proven their mettle time and again, and I have every faith that resourceful producers will always weather the storm, backed by an association that's dedicated to their success.

Turning a book, play, short film or series into a film is no easy feat on the best of days. Add in uncertain market conditions, razor-thin budgets and frenzied competition, and you're left with a situation where only the fittest survive. Adapt or die, the saying goes—and Canadian producers are rising to the challenge

Somebody will always insist that the book is better. Or the play, or the series, or the video game. But, given how many film adaptations get made around the world, producers obviously aren't listening to that guy.

And why should they? According to *Forbes*, film adaptations of books make 44 per cent more at the UK box office and 53 per cent more worldwide than films made from original screenplays. While those may not be Canadian numbers, they hint at the irresistible draw of IP that has already been proven and found an audience.

Of course, none of this suggests that adaptations present an easy path for filmmakers. The road to a successful film adaptation is littered with a thousand decisions around what to add and what to leave, how faithful to remain to the source material, how to preserve what was seductive about the original work and translate it into an entirely different medium—all without, hopefully, alienating a so-called "built-in" audience and tarnishing the brand forever.

And, particularly if you're making a movie in Canada, those challenges are met in the middle of an uphill struggle for funding, distribution, and eyeballs for your film—and hopefully coming out the other end with a bit more money in your pocket (or at least not less). In our increasingly competitive, topsy-turvy cinema landscape, one thing is clear: adapting to these ever-evolving conditions is every bit as tricky as adapting a book or play to a film, and even more essential to survival. Here, we share the stories of three producers, at different stages of their careers and in different ways, who are pulling off that trick.



VIRGINIA THOMPSON, VÉRITÉ FILMS

THE MOVIE NEWBIE

Virginia Thompson, president of Vérité Films, had never made a movie before, but she knew what made her brand tick. That brand is *Corner Gas*, the beloved, sleepy Saskatchewan sitcom that averaged a million viewers an episode and ended its six-season run on CTV at the top of its game. And the thing that made it tick was its voice—or, more specifically, creator Brent Butt's voice.

"If you lose the voice, you lose everything," Thompson says.

Preserving the voice of *Corner Gas*—oddball, folksy, deadpan—through six seasons, a movie, and a new animated series is Prairie Pants Productions' (the company formed by Thompson, Butt and director David Storey) signal achievement. It is, arguably, the main reason the movie grossed nearly \$700,000 over a five-day run in 100 cinemas across Canada, followed by a preview on The Movie Network and a broadcast on CTV. But the whole story involves a lot more legwork than that.

First of all, the motive: "We didn't want to make a movie to just make a movie," Thompson insists. "We were doing it as a gift to our fans. We wanted to say thank you for six incredible seasons."

The rest of the tale plays like a comedic drama in its own right: Thompson, the plucky producer, demolishes obstacles and silences naysayers, ingeniously raising hundreds of thousands of dollars to finance the film, bypassing the lack of a tax credit in the filming location, and securing a theatrical release with a phone call to one of the biggest bigwigs in Canadian cinema.

"When you make a movie, it's a very big deal. *It's a very big deal*," repeats Thompson, then laughs. "Listen to me, the TV girl, thinking she's telling producers something they don't know! But it is really tough to make a great movie."

Adapting *Corner Gas*, the show, into *Corner Gas*: *The Movie* was one of the first hurdles. Thompson says she and Storey worked closely with Butt and some of the show's writers to craft the film script, which was eventually written twice, to ensure that they had in fact created a *movie*, not just an extended episode. They brought in drama writer Andrew Wreggitt to help structure the screenplay and take it to where it needed to be, all while preserving Butt's voice. Recalls Thompson, "It was a very delicate balance, bringing in a movie writer and letting him inform the process without taking the project over. Adaptation is a very delicate thing."

Thompson claims that while the team tried to secure development funding, they were ultimately unsuccessful. "Even with a great script, I think that the brand of *Corner Gas*, as a kind of iconic television brand, hurt us rather than helped us. At the beginning, nobody was convinced that the film was going to work "she says

So Thompson rolled up her sleeves and got down to research. She studied every detail of the *Veronica Mars* movie release, as an example of a successfully crowdfunded series-to-film adaptation. She launched a Kickstarter campaign (and far-reaching digital engagement campaign) of her own, raising \$100,000 in a single day, and close to \$300,000 by the campaign's end. Then Thompson set her sights on the next burdle

In 2012, two years before the team got down to work on the movie, Saskatchewan had eliminated its film tax credit. "Of course, a lack of tax credit is problematic for any producer, and obviously location is extremely important to *Corner Gas*," Thompson says. Unfazed, she went straight to the Saskatchewan government. In this case, the iconic *Corner Gas* brand saved the day: "We had really constructive meetings with the government to see if there was a way that we could make filming work there. Because of the huge tourism component to *Corner Gas*, because we're such a part of the fabric of Saskatchewan, they found a way to make it work without the tax credit. Which was a huge relief, and opened to the door to Telefilm's support."

Now the funding pieces were in place. Next obstacle: securing a theatrical release in the absence of interest from any of Canada's distribution companies. Solution: cold-calling Michael Kennedy, Cineplex's Executive Vice President of Filmed Entertainment.

"I didn't know him, but I called him," Thompson explains. "We were determined to get in theatres. We didn't want to make a television movie. We wanted to create an *event*." For that, they needed Cineplex and Bell Media (owner of CTV) to work together on windowing, to allow the excitement from the

theatrical release to carry over into the television broadcast. At her meeting with Kennedy, he told her Cineplex was in. And Prairie Pants became the film's distributor


It's a heartwarming ending to a never-say-die tale: the movie sold out theatres for its brief run, bringing in close to \$700,000 at the box office, ultimately reaching 7 million fans around the country. This success set the stage for a new permutation of the brand, an animated series that's in its second season on The Comedy Network. And, on top of that, the ending has a dash of feel-good IP retention: while Bell Media is the official distributor of Corner Gas, Prairie Pants Distribution now has sub-distribution rights in the United States for the live-action series, the movie and the animated series. The live-action series launched on Amazon Prime Video in December, and the animated series is anticipated to follow.

It's a great ending, but it was hard won. According to Thompson, "I wasn't just a producer, I was a distributor, I was a marketer, I was the head of social media and engagement. Our little office did all that work on a classic feature-film budget, putting all the money on the screen and trying our very best." By putting together an entire marketing, crowdfunding and distribution plan before meeting with funders, Thompson illustrates the advantages of staying far ahead of the game: "It was all worked out beforehand. I didn't just go in and say, 'Hey, this is a great script. Do you like it?'"

She adds, half-joking, "I mean, making the film nearly killed me. Even just thinking about making another movie—I don't know if I have the stomach for it." Then, with an independent producer's instinctive self-forgetfulness, she says brightly: "But it was a hit!"

THE UP-AND-COMER

When the short you produce for your film-school thesis gets into TIFF, what's your follow-up act? How about adapting the short into a feature film that gets picked up for international distribution before it premieres at TIFF, gets on the festival's year-end Top Ten list, scoops up an armful of Canadian Screen Awards, and nabs you the Kevin Tierney Emerging Producer Award at the Indiescreen Awards? If that sounds like a dream for a first-time feature-film producer, Caitlin Grabham is living it.

In 2018, Grabham and her writer/director partner Jasmin Mozaffari (Prowler Film), expanded *Firecrackers*, the short film they made in their final year at Ryerson University, into a feature of the same name. But Grabham insists a longer film wasn't in their sights while they were developing the 15-minute short.

"The short came out of our desire to see women that we could relate to on screen," says Grabham. "We didn't make it thinking, 'Oh, we'll turn this into a feature one day.' We were just really focused on trying to make a good film. In fact, I wouldn't recommend making a short in order to make a feature. Those can read like teasers, and can fail to develop their own identity."

Grabham's short film—about two teenaged best friends struggling to escape their grim northern Ontario town—underwent major transformation on its journey to a full-length film. The feature preserved the premise, but expanded the narrative arc, added a raft of characters, and replaced the original leads, who had aged out of the roles.

"Some of the most consistent feedback we got on the short film was from young women who said they felt like it was just a glimpse into a world," says Grabham. "They wished they could see more. So we knew that we were onto something special, and the idea to make a feature developed quite naturally. We didn't start from scratch, exactly—the characters and the base were there—but we didn't hold ourselves to the short at all."

Another transformation was the budget, from \$15,000 for the short to a quarter-million dollars for the feature—"which was still very tight," Grabham notes. A portion of that came from Telefilm's Talent to Watch Program (formerly the Micro-Budget Production Program), a fund for first feature-length films. The program is surely a lifeline for first-time filmmakers, but their tiny budget meant Grabham and Mozaffari had to go with non-union actors ("We looked at ACTRA, but there was no way we could afford it"), Grabham had to move back home with her parents while working on Firecrackers ("It's not necessarily ideal, but I would not have been able to make the film without that support"), and the pair have yet to collect a penny for their efforts.

"People seem to expect that because we made this well-received film, things are just going to take off," says Grabham. "But we worked on this film pretty much full-time for about three and a half years, and we've made zero dollars off of it so far."

By reinvesting all of her funding back into the film, by finding skilled crew members who were still on the verge of success, Grabham accomplished the incredible feat of making a movie in Canada. But she doesn't feel that the model is a sustainable one, and when she's asked about financing by other new filmmakers, she says, "I really don't know what to tell them."

It's a grim reminder that, in Canada, even the best-case scenario—making an attention-grabbing, award-winning feature film on your first try—isn't the fairy tale it appears to be. There are positive signs on the horizon for Grabham, however. She is working with Conquering Lion Pictures, trying to gain experience and figure out how to make money making movies. She's eyeing TV, since "the barrier between film and television is pretty much dissolving," though she doesn't think she'll ever give up on feature film. And, since the Talent to Watch Program doesn't allow the writer/director/producer teams to share ownership with other partners, Grabham and Mozaffari own the Firecrackers IP entirely.

"I don't think we're going to do anything more with *Firecrackers*," Grabham says. "But who knows? Maybe in a decade we'll do a TV series."

However the success of *Firecrackers* is defined, Grabham defied all odds, buckled down and made that movie—with determination and self-sacrifice that will doubtless serve her well in the industry.

"We were the first people in our year at school to make a feature film, which I really didn't expect," she admits. "There were other people who seemed to have so much more experience or who were getting into different festivals. But we really dedicated ourselves to doing this."

CHRISTINA PIOVESAN, FIRST GENERATION FILMS

Christina Piovesan is a good person to talk to about being a film producer in Canada these days. She's the principal of First Generation Films, where she produces everything from feature films to web series (she's got three films and one short being released this year alone). Past movies include *The Whistleblower* (based on the experiences of a UN peacekeeper in post-war Bosnia and Herzegovina), *The Lesser Blessed* (based on a novel by Richard Van Camp) and *Mouthpiece* (based on an awardwinning play by Amy Nostbakken and Norah Sadava). She's also the co-chair of the CMPA's Feature Film Committee, which means she thinks quite a lot about making movies in Canada.

"Working with established IP is really important for an independent producer," says Piovesan. "It's an extremely competitive time, and it's always helpful if someone else has already proven that the IP has found an audience."


While audience is important, in her adaptation work, Piovesan does not chain herself to the source material. "With a book or play, you need to read it or watch it and then walk away from it," says Piovesan. "But at the same time you want to honour the spirit of the book. Because if you are going to take it and not keep anything, what's the value?"

In fact, Piovesan did not even see *Mouthpiece*, the play, until she had wrapped production on *Mouthpiece*, the movie. Nor did she wish her team, led by writer/director Patricia Rozema, had done anything differently. The play is a high-concept art piece in which two actors play one woman. The movie also features two actors playing one woman, but Piovesan insists that while they echo each other, they are very much separate entities.

"There were so many ways in which the film became its own thing," says Piovesan. "Patricia introduced the central character of the mother, who is not present at all in the play. Even things that the team was trying to preserve—little vignettes, musical centrepieces—were ultimately cut back in post-production, because we felt they didn't fit into the language of film. It was really in post that the film, thanks to the work of Patricia and our editor Lara Johnston, really found its cinematic voice."

"It's an extremely It's a wonderful picture of the way the entire film process, from script development to filming to post-production, comes together to create an entity that's both dependent on and divorced from the original text. IP opens the door, but filmmakers walk through it.

Just as she is happy to leave out what's not working in her films, Piovesan isn't beholden to any preconceived notions of what a Canadian production company should look like or who it should work with. It's a philosophy that has allowed her to team up with partners from all corners, rather than "chasing a passport."

"Who your buyers are, how you finance your project, how you pull it together—sure, use the tools in your own backyard, but you also have to go out and get tools and resources from anywhere in service of creating your own IP," says Piovesan. "You can't get bogged down by old rules."

Casting off the "rules," keeping only what works, finding new ways to rise above the challenges endemic to filmmaking in this country: it's Piovesan's approach, but it's also the approach of many producers and production companies across Canada, who are finding innovative ways to adapt and develop IP.

Take Wattpad Studios, the content-creation arm of the wildly popular self-publishing app best described as "YouTube for fiction" (see "Wattpad Lights Up the Black Box" in the fall 2017 issue of *Indiescreen*). According to Wattpad, its access to a vast amount of user data and community insights essentially "de-risks" the adaptation process. A number of Wattpad stories have already been released as box-office-topping films in the Philippines, and the YA romance *After*, produced by Aviron Pictures in the US, hit theatres in April 2019, grossing nearly \$70 million worldwide. Entertainment One is planning series based off Wattpad stories *The Numbered* and *Kairos*, and hopes to swerve around any potholes in the adaptation process by running the pilot script by fans of the original stories.

In similarly disruptive style, The Coup Company runs film accelerators, in which filmmakers upload pitches and audiences vote on them. Filmmakers can garner support and a fan base before their project is even optioned or greenlit. The campy *WolfCop* movies and the horror *Hellmington* are two films to emerge from the initiative.

From these examples and many others, it's clear Canada's independent production industry is filled with keeners, innovators and experimenters—survivors. They're determined and they're dedicated, no matter the forecast.

Somebody will always insist that this industry is too tough, the hurdles too high. But Canada's independent producers clearly aren't listening to that guy.

THE SHORT AND THE LONG OF IT



Interested in turning your short film into a feature? We spoke with Justine Whyte, Director of the Canadian Film Centre's CFC Features program—which helps writers, directors and producers make their feature films a reality—to glean best practices for emerging producers

Find your audience. Get your short seen by as many people as possible by submitting it to festivals in Canada and around the world. Consider releasing it online. You can find a market for you feature before it's even made.

Get feedback on your project. Putting your short out into the world isn't just about getting seen; it's also an opportunity to learn and adapt accordingly. What did audiences and critics love about it? Give them more of what they want in your feature. Leave out what didn't work

Look at your short film as a trial run. In addition to figuring ou what did and didn't work, think about who worked and didn't work. You have to believe in the team you're working with, both above and below the line. Don't rush into the feature without your dream team in place.

Think of your short film as a calling card, both for your film and for you as a producer. The more you get your film out there, the more you'll be exposed to individuals in the industry who could help you get your feature off the ground.

Consider public and private funders (Harold Greenberg Fund's Short to Features Program, Telefilm Canada's Talent to Watch Program, your provincial government funding agency) as well as industry organizations (CFC, National Screen Institute, provincia trade associations, the CMPA).

It's about the art of the possible. Make sure your concept is truly workable as a feature-length film. If not, consider another project; you can always come back to this one later.

Don't let yourself be boxed in by your short. Your short an your feature are two completely separate pieces of work. Adaptation is, by definition, something new. It can take you to unexpected places. Embrace that.







Before joining Telefilm Canada last summer, you helmed Interactive Ontario. Are there any lessons Canadian independent producers can learn from interactive digital media producers?

I think that across the audiovisual industry—regardless of sector—everyone is facing the same challenges. Whether we're making films or video games, there's no shortage of excellent storytelling in Canada. The two biggest challenges are financing and discoverability, particularly in a media world where there are no more borders. What the interactive digital media industry brings to the table is that spirit of entrepreneurship, being willing to do whatever it takes to market their product. With all of the changes in today's market and to consumers' habits, this new generation of producers will need to embrace that spirit more than ever.

How can Telefilm Canada help producers cross that bridge?

Maybe we need to emphasize and promote our own services in a way that makes it clear that we're not just here to finance films, we're also here to make sure the films have visibility—that they get to the right marketplace. Telefilm organizes 10 Canadian pavilions and has a presence at over 35 festivals and markets around the world every year, which are an incredible opportunity to network, to sell your production, and to find co-production partners. Because, of course, once you're in a co-production situation, you've changed your landscape: you can have bigger budgets and greater talent, and you're automatically doubling the potential eyeballs on your film. Telefilm can help get producers to that next level.

What are your priorities at Telefilm?

What I'm really looking for is to make sure that Telefilm evolves—evolves with Canadian consumers, Canadian society and Canadian values. I'm looking at what we're doing and why we're doing it. I'm searching for new collaborative opportunities, and reviewing and enhancing the strategic partnerships that we've had for a long time, to make sure that they remain just that: strategic.

We'll have a mandate out soon for an external auditor to look at our financing programs and processes, to ensure that they're efficient and mirror best practices across Canada and the world. We're doing a program optimization exercise, to ensure all of our programs are operating as effectively as possible. Already from day one, I identified that Telefilm's Success Index was in need of an update. Before we know it, it'll be 2021, and we'll be celebrating the index's 10th anniversary—by then, we need to have Success Index number two in place. We'll go into consultation on that in the next year or so.

Revising the funding allocation approach is necessary, and I'm being transparent about that. I know that things can be, from a procedural perspective, very slow. That can take a financial toll on producers, and I want to minimize that burden as much as possible for them.

Theatrical release is a substantial component of the Success Index, and necessary to trigger funding in some cases. Given the shifting consumer landscape, do you think theatrical release should continue to be a requirement?

I believe the theatrical release is always going to be a part of a film's DNA. It's true that how and where people are consuming the content is shifting drastically, but rather than diminishing the importance of theatrical release in Telefilm's Success Index, we need to start looking at what is not in the index that probably should be. Theatrical release will continue to have a place, but how it gets weighed in relation to the other elements remains to be seen.

You obviously want to see Canadian feature films thrive well into the future. What's going to help us achieve that?

We need to recognize that the challenges that we face are not exclusively

Canadian, but we do have that giant next to us. We've always been under that shadow, and will continue to be. The beautiful thing is that Canada is a mirror of the world. How can we turn that into an advantage, and make sure that we are telling and marketing our unique stories so that those at home and outside Canada want to consume them? We clearly need more funding in the pipeline. We need to put more dollars behind the production and in the marketing. Because, as rapidly as our habits are changing, I don't think we're ever going to stop consuming films. Whether at a movie theatre or on a couch, films are a gathering experience for people. There will always be **TELEFILM** a place for feature film, and I'm committed to helping carve out room for C A N A D A Canadian feature film within that.





Virtual reality (VR) has been poised on the edge of a mainstream breakout for some time now, in gaming as well as in cinema. But since we're now used to technology advancing at lightning speed some of us are tapping our feet and looking at our watches.

Joanne-Aśka Popińska, founder of immersive media studio Tribe of Pan, understands this impatience. She is quick to point out that other filmmaking technologies—3D, for example—were hardly overnight successes.

"Everyone always thinks 3D started with *Avatar* in 2009. The truth is that 3D was born the same day that cinema was born," she says, referring to the 3D movie process developed by English inventor William Friese-Greene in 1894, in which two films are projected side by side while the viewer looks through a stereoscope, which converges the images and creates depth. "So 3D took how long to gain popularity—120 years? VR will catch up."

So maybe audiences should be patient for the next revolution in cinema. After all, by removing the barrier between audience and film, VR promises to go much further than 3D ever did.

WORLD WITHOUT SCREENS

"For the first time in the era of mass media, we've gotten rid of the screen," explains Stefan Grambart, a creator who specializes in immersive digital content (for example, he created VR episodes for Secret Location's futuristic detective series *Halcyon*). "No matter how realistic the visuals, we are always aware that we are sitting in our living room watching a show on television, or that we have a plastic controller in our hands, controlling a character on a screen. Now, we are putting viewers inside that content, asking them to become more like actors and less like audience members."

What that means for creators is not only a whole new set of tools—360 cameras and VR headsets, just to get started—but a whole new vocabulary and a whole new way of thinking.

Grambart holds up the word "cinematography," for example: "In linear films, cinematography is based on what is or isn't on screen: for example, a lone figure at a distance walking from screen left to screen right typically implies solitude in a vast space, but how does that change when there is no screen? When the viewer can look too early or too late?" In effect, VR asks viewers to become not only actors, but cinematographers as well: they decide when and where to look, and for how long.

Creating VR also presents new technical challenges. If there is no screen, then there is also no "behind the lens." Directors and crew need to become invisible, since there is no hiding from a 360° camera. Grambart describes projects where the crew dressed up as extras or hid behind structures. The single take also presents difficulties in the editing room. And screenwriters will need to grapple with creating a story that works for interactivity.

Says Grambart, "It's really hard to write a story where the outcomes are unpredictable. It's very foreign to a linear scriptwriter to not be able to set something up in act one that then pays off in act three. What you need to do in VR is focus on telling the story through spaces."

WORLD WITHOUT HAPPY ENDINGS

Filmmaker Lisa Jackson has always loved creating unique spaces for her films, such as *Savage* (2009) and *Lichen* (2019). What's important to her is "getting people to feel something," and VR has allowed her to take that to a whole new level.

Take her VR short film, *Biidaaban: First Light*, which has "screened" at festivals and art galleries around the globe. Jackson worked with 3D artist Matthew Borrett, design agency Jam3 and the National Film Board to create the eight-minute piece, which depicts a Toronto that has been reclaimed by nature. Buildings are crumbling, Nathan Phillips Square is flooded, rooftops are green with foliage, an upturned canoe rests on a subway station platform. A narrator speaks in several ancient Indigenous languages: Wendat, Kanien'kehá:ka (Mohawk), Anishinaabe (Ojibwe). Judging from participants' reactions, the effect is powerful.

"I can't tell you how many times I've seen groups of people bounce into the space, joking around—'Oh, we're going to do a fun VR piece!' And when they walk out, they are speechless or in tears," says Jackson. "With VR, the sense of embodiment or actually visiting somewhere, rather than watching something, is so strong that it actually seems to engage people's emotions, much more than you would expect for an eight-minute film."

Like Grambart, Jackson appreciates the ability of VR to create environments and circumstances and place people inside them. "But what you can't do is have shots," she points out. Facial expressions, reactions, the juxtaposition of shots to create pacing—VR typically throws all that out the window in favour of space, and time to explore that space. She recognizes that this open-endedness "drives a lot of people crazy," but appeals to filmmakers interested in different narrative structures "beyond whether the boy gets the girl or other human-driven stories." With *Biidaaban*, "people seem to be reacting to something that goes beyond a happy ending," she says.

Jackson admits that there are certain things in *Biidaaban* that she would like participants to see, but she can't guarantee that they will be seen. While there are tricks to capture viewers' attention—sound, for example, or orienting them in a certain direction when they enter the scene—she cannot make them keep looking where she wants them to once they are in the environment.

"After they're in, all bets are off," she says. "But if you're creating a space where only a portion is interesting because that's where you want people to look, I would argue that your film might not be best suited to VR."

Grambart concurs. He often works with film and TV producers and directors to take their property into an interactive space. The question they ask him most often is, "How do you get the audience to look where you want them to look?" He insists that's "the wrong question—that's a screen question. Game designers use tricks like animation or contrasting light and dark to guide users through a space, but the most powerful tool is still to tell a really good story. Give the audience something to look at that they want to find out about."

WORLD WITHOUT MAPS

The barriers holding VR back from mass-market success are well documented: expensive equipment, cumbersome setup, eyestrain from headsets, no clear distribution model. The technology can't yet support full-length films. VR cinemas are popping up here and there, but are still thin on the ground (notably, Cineplex plans to open 30 to 40 VR systems in its theatres by the end of 2021). But even if audiences need to wait patiently for VR to reach its tipping point, filmmakers interested in exploring it should dive right in.

According to Grambart, there's no need to feel like you need to know everything about VR before you begin—"you just need to know the people to work with, and understand the language to be able to talk to those people."

Popińska advises bingeing on VR to get a sense of its possibilities. "Watch as many VRs as you can," she counsels.

"We still have this landscape to explore, but that just means it's open to experimentation and innovation. Nobody should be telling you, 'This is the one right way to do things.'"

nould be telling you, is the one right way to do things."

That emotional connection, to Popińska, is VR's defining feature.

More than interactivity, more than "presence"—a VR term that denotes the sensation of actually being inside a virtual world—VR cements a memory in the brain

of the participant, as real as any made in the physical world. These memories "last much, much longer than anything you see on a traditional screen," says Popińska.

She's leaning on this aspect of VR for her current project, *The Choice*, a VR documentary that places the participant inside the body and consciousness of a woman dealing with an unplanned pregnancy. It also invites you into conversations with real women who have undergone abortions.

"Everything that can be said around that debate has been said, so I couldn't add anything that way," says Popińska. "But one thing I thought was missing was human stories. We're more likely to empathize with the decisions of people we know. VR lets us use that psychology to enhance our understanding of others' choices."

Biidaaban and *The Choice* present two very different avenues in VR—one decentres humans, while the other foregrounds them. There may be no contradiction, however. While creating VR may appear constraining, creators are still free to write their own rules.

Says Grambart: "We still have this landscape to explore, but that just means it's open to experimentation and innovation. Nobody should be telling you, 'This is the one right way to do things.' Whenever someone gives you advice or tells you how they've approached projects, take it with a grain of salt. You shouldn't be afraid to break things and go your own way."

Even if widespread adoption of VR is two, five, 10 years away, it's not too early to get started. The script's not written yet, and the players are waiting.

Shortly after last year's festival, Joana Vicente took the reins as TIFF's executive director and co-head, working alongside artistic director and co-head Cameron Bailey. The Portuguese-born film producer spent nine years as executive director of the Independent Filmmaker Project (IFP) in New York, and is delighted to now be steering what she calls "one of the best festivals in the world." Vicente spoke to us about the role of festivals in a fast-changing industry, new initiatives for Canadian creators, and why producers should run the world—or, at the very least, a film festival.

What compelled you to join TIFF when the opportunity presented itself?

First of all, I love this festival. As a producer, I always loved bringing my films here—great audiences, great Q&As, and you really get a sense if a film is going to work in the marketplace. It's also an amazing place to do business; I sold at least three or four films here over the years. TIFF brings everything together: the audiences, the industry, the press. It's the combination of all of these stakeholders that makes this amazing event work. I also love the fact that we have a building, TIFF Bell Lightbox, with cinema space and these amazing theatres with great sound and images.

TIFF seemed like something that would stretch me, and I believe I thrive when I'm being challenged. I also feel like there is such energy right now in Toronto. It's an exciting new chapter, for me and for the festival.

have to be extremely entrepreneurial and innovative. You're creating can we make TIFF even more a brand from scratch every time."

Because the industry is changing "As a producer, you so quickly all around us, I want to ask: What role can festivals play in the future? What are our responsibilities? How can we evolve and lead the way? How exciting and relevant, a real part of the fabric of this incredible city? Those guestions really excite me.

As you say, the industry is changing. How audiences view films is changing, with big studios squeezing smaller players out of the theatre. What do you think is the role of an independent producer or filmmaker in today's system?

It is challenging to have, on one hand, our current moment of major studio consolidation and, on the other, a sustainable, diverse ecosystem of independent voices. But at the same time, I believe those voices are so important, because they are outside of the mainstream, and that's sometimes where transformation happens. A lot of directors who are making huge studio films—from Ryan Coogler to Denis Villeneuve—come from the world of independent filmmaking.

While it's great to see the studios tapping talent with a distinct voice, it is a challenge for small films to get noticed. Even with so many distribution and platform options to reach audiences, there is so much product—how do you choose? How do you stumble upon great stuff?

But no matter how challenging it is, I think there will always be room and appetite for those strong original voices. Honestly, I think that's where festivals come in. We are finding and discovering this incredible talent, giving them a platform, and helping them build audiences through exhibition at TIFF Bell Lightbox.



You've had a fairly prolific career as an independent producer. How does that experience and perspective shape what you hope to

As a producer, you have to be extremely entrepreneurial and innovative. You're creating a brand from scratch every time. You have to fundraise, you have to put the best people together, you have to make them work well together. You're working in partnership with the director to help them realize their vision. You're thinking about the audience for the film. Those varied skill sets will inform my decisions in a major way. Everything I've gained as a producer—industry knowledge, a deep understanding of what goes into making films, knowing how to figure out the market for them—all of that is going to serve me well as we position TIFF for the future.

In the past, a film was a film and a TV show was a TV show. Today, with streaming services, the lines between them are getting blurred, in terms of content length, where it gets watched, and so on. What role does theatregoing play in today's landscape?

I think it's actually exciting that people are moving fluidly between so-called television (or serialized content) and films. The conventions that have been in place for so long—a film must be between an hour and a half and two and a half hours, a TV show must be less than half an hour or an hour—are disappearing. All of a sudden, creators have the ability to ask what platform works best for the story they want to tell. Do I need 12 hours to develop my characters over time, or is the best form still the conventional 90 minutes?

One of our sections at TIFF is Primetime [television premieres from around the world], and we'll continue to experiment with showing types of content beyond film and embracing more fluid forms of storytelling. But we do value the cinematic experience: bringing people together and giving them the opportunity to see films in their best form. Whether the films are released on a streaming platform or make it to theatres, what we value is how the film resonates with audiences in our beautiful, darkened theatres.

What are your thoughts on the state of Canadian filmmaking today? How can TIFF—both as a festival and a year-round organization—help to grow the film production sector in Canada?

There really is exceptional talent here, and we want our industry programs and talent labs to continue to foster that talent and address gaps. With Share Her Journey, we really try to address the need for parity in the industry—we need to help build the pipeline for female writers and directors and producers. (I'm excited that this year, half of TIFF's programmers are women!) TIFF developed a Writers' Studio program for screenwriters after identifying a need for more assistance in that area.

Also, feature films selected for Canada's Top Ten now have the opportunity for a theatrical run at the Lightbox. This is a major benefit for Canadian creators. Without duplicating efforts from other industry organizations, we'll continue to think about initiatives that advance the industry as a whole, while celebrating the remarkable talent that's here in Canada.

THE INDIESCREEN AWARDS GO NATIONAL

PRODUCERS WITH FILMS AT TIFF, CIFF, VIFF AND FIN ARE NOW ELIGIBLE FOR THE **BIG PRIZE**

The CMPA is a national organization, representing independent producers from coast to coast to coast. And the CMPA has proudly taken its annual Indiescreen Awards national as well.



The Indiescreen Awards were established in 2005, to recognize outstanding producers in both the established and emerging categories—producers whose work and vision demonstrates a commitment to and passion for producing Canadian feature films. Past winners of the Established Producer Award include leading lights such as Simone Urdl and Jennifer Weiss (Falls Around Her), Kim McCraw and Luc Déry (A Worthy Companion), and Roger Frappier (Two Lovers and a Bear). Past winners of the Kevin Tierney Emerging Producer Award include Caitlin Grabham (Firecrackers), Kristy Neville and Matt Code (Mary Goes Round), and Hany Ouichou (Those Who Make Revolution Halfway Only Dig Their Own Graves).

Until now, award applicants were required to have a feature film screening at the Toronto International Film Festival (TIFF). This year, three more festivals have been added to the eligibility list: Calgary International Film Festival (CIFF), FIN Atlantic International Film Festival, and Vancouver International Film Festival (VIFF).

"The Indiescreen Awards are an opportunity to bring attention to the incredible work being done by Canada's independent feature film producers, who bring distinct Canadian stories to life on screen," says CMPA President and CEO Reynolds Mastin. "We are excited to expand the awards to include festivals from across the country, and to open eligibility to a greater number of producers and perspectives.

Film festivals are held in seemingly every pocket of this country, so extending the eligibility criteria to festivals held in different regions of Canada feels right. TIFF has provided stellar support to the awards from day one; allowing other festivals the chance to offer that same support feels

It has been the CMPA's pleasure and honour to partner with TIFF for the first 14 years of the Indiescreen Awards. Starting out in 1976 as a collection of films from other festivals, TIFF has become one of the most beloved cinematic events in the world, universally regarded as an ideal platform for filmmakers to launch their careers and to premiere their new work. TIFF has been described as "the most important film festival in the world—the largest, the most influential, the most inclusive.



The CMPA is pleased to continue the fruitful partnership it's enjoyed with TIFF around the Indiescreen Awards. At the same time, the association is pleased to be bringing new players into the fold.

The Calgary International Film Festival has been held since 2000, tripling its attendance from 8,000 to 20,000 within three years of its inception. Last year, the festival—Alberta's largest—hit a record 38,000 attendees. CIFF's focus on "creating remarkable festival experiences" includes hosting a large number of filmmakers, both local and international, and emphasizing interactivity and connections between fans and creators. The festival also devotes at least one gala a year to an Alberta feature, underscoring its role as a champion of film in

FIN Atlantic International Film Festival has been held in Halifax since 1980. The festival is an esteemed platform for the best of Atlantic Canadian and international film, and a gathering place for the east coast's filmmaking and film-loving community. It also plays host to FIN Partners (formerly Strategic Partners), Canada's premier film and television co-production market—a onestop shop for producers looking for their next co-production partner.

The Vancouver International Film Festival has been a fixture of the west-coast film scene since it was first held in 1982. Screening films from approximately 75 countries, the festival's lineup makes it stand out. VIFF screens more East Asian films than any festival outside of that region; has one of the largest documentary selections outside of a documentary film festival; and boasts one of the biggest showcases of Canadian film in the world.

By opening up the Indiescreen Awards to producers with films screening at any of these September festivals, the competition just got more exciting. More festivals, more films, more perspectives—and an enhanced opportunity to recognize and celebrate producers committed to putting Canadian film on the map.

On falling into the new job

"My wife and I were about to have our first kid when I got an email out of nowhere from a producer working on Hector and the Search for Happiness, with Simon Pegg. It was perfect timing—a project that I could work on from home! The script was done, but they hadn't shot a thing. For Hilda, it was a pitch job: they needed a theme song, I sent one, and I ended up doing the closing theme and scoring the first several episodes of the show. With Unspeakable, I met [creator] Robert Cooper's post supervisor literally at a play café, where our toddlers were playing. She discovered I was a musician, and I ended up meeting with Cooper for lunch. It was just one of those random things."

On natural selection in the evolution of film composing

"Pretty much all the classical composers in the 20th century just became film composers, because that's the only way that people spent money to get an orchestra to perform anything. That's how we got so many incredible iconic composers, like John Williams, Thomas Newman, Alan Silvestri. And now the adaptation of technology has totally changed that. A composer no longer has to conceive of something hypothetically and then present it to an orchestra, crossing their fingers that it goes well. Now you can actually sync everything right to picture in your home, on your laptop. It's a whole new world, and it's allowed—probably much to the chagrin of the classical composing world—people like myself to have a place in it."

On working over Skype

"With some projects, I don't even meet the creative team. With Hilda, it was all done over video chats. But while it may have been too had that I didn't get a lot of face time, I was able to get the gig from all the way out here in Vancouver, when the show was being done in New York and Ottawa. What an interesting experience that was."

On the power of a score, for good or ill


"If it's an emotional scene, the music has to add to that emotion, but it can't be too on the nose or over the top, because it will sink the scene—you're just telling people what to feel. It's a very fine line. The right music will take a good scene and make it great, or take a great scene and make it incredible. And the wrong music will take any scene at all and make it terrible."

On the difference between making records and scoring films

"If it's my own music, I'm the dictator. I have final say on everything. One of the biggest learning curves for me in composing was figuring out how to be a cog in a much larger wheel. This is not my money on the line. This is not my baby. In composing, my job is to be a service provider for the director and the producers—I need to deliver something that excites them and helps them achieve what they're looking for. That was a big paradigm shift. I would have so many ideas, and I would want to talk and show and talk and show, but I soon realized that the best thing I could do was shut up and listen."

HECTOR AND THE SEARCH



On learning to read a director's mind

"My initial impetus with each project is to get inside the director's head and try to have some kind of empathic understanding of what they're looking for, so that we can begin to speak the same language. Because it's very rare that you come across a director who is a schooled musician: they might say 'softer,' but they mean 'quieter.' Or they might say 'less,' but they mean 'slower.' So there is this distance to traverse, and if I can get inside their head to some degree, kind of see the project through their eyes, it's more likely that I can present them something on the first try that is in the ballpark.

On failing to read a director's mind


"Of course, I've also had the other experience, where I've been working for three days on something and I think it's a masterpiece, and I send it to them, and they're on set in China somewhere, and are like, 'Um, no. Try again.'"

On gleaning from the cutting-room floor

"Without fail, the work that I do on these projects ends up influencing whatever it is that I do on my next record. I buy a cool synth because I think the soundtrack needs a cool synth, and that becomes the bedrock for a bunch of new songs. And any time I send an idea that the team isn't feeling, I'm like, 'Great!' And it goes in the folder on my desktop that says 'Stuff for later."

On watching the royalties roll in

"I remember when we were having our first kid. I was thinking, 'Man, I'm travelling nine months of the year. How can I plan for the future so that I can have some passive income? How can I create a body of work that will help me put together a college fund for my kid—which ended up being kids—without having to travel all the time?' I'm not saying that I've created this enormous amount of wealth, but it is nice to know that I'm adding to a beaker of work that will hopefully spill over at one point."


HOW GOVERNMENT CAN SUPPORT CANADA'S VIBRANT INDEPENDENT PRODUCTION SECTOR

1. APPLY STABLE FUNDING MECHANISMS TO ALL PLAYERS WITHOUT INCREASING COSTS FOR CONSUMERS.

Canadians now watch programming from a variety of sources: through their TVs, computers and mobile devices. But only traditional broadcasters and cable companies are required to make financial contributions to support Canadian programming, and their contributions are declining even though

Canadians are watching more programming than ever. Updating funding mechanisms—without increasing costs for consumers—will reflect modern viewing habits and help ensure a vibrant domestic industry well into the future.

2. INCREASE TELEFILM CANADA'S PARLIAMENTARY APPROPRIATION BY AN ADDITIONAL \$50 MILLION.



#METOO NOW

TWO YEARS AFTER A HASHTAG ROCKED THE INDUSTRY, WHERE DO WE STAND?

In fall 2017, allegations of sexual abuse against mega-producer Harvey Weinstein and multiple other movie-industry heavyweights sent shock waves through Hollywood that were felt around the world. The hundreds of thousands of women who came forward with their own stories of assault drove many companies into deep reflection on their workplace culture, as well as their hiring policies. The resulting push for equal opportunity, equal representation, equal pay and safe working conditions promises to transform a desperately unbalanced system into something far more inclusive—but the fight's not over yet. We asked three prominent women involved in different facets of the industry—April Mullen, Tonya Williams and Karen Bruce—for their own takes on how far we've come, and how far we still have to go.





APRIL MULLEN

LET US ROAR by April Mullen

There are new perspectives emerging, new voices, new talent. We are on the brink of exciting times and the creation of non-stereotypical content; it's been a long journey to get here, but I believe audiences will find it refreshing.

I have had a very different experience in the industry. Because it was such an impossible feat to get my first film off the ground 13 years ago, I had to start my own production company (Wango Films) to create self-generated work alongside Tim Doiron. For over a decade, I've been fully immersed in producing and directing. It has been full of challenges on all fronts, especially being a woman at the helm of a creative venture. In all honesty, on a daily basis I have struggled and still do struggle with ignorant, disrespectful and condescending comments, but I have noticed in the last two years a tremendous amount of change around me.

While grinding away with every ounce of my being to get films made, I continuously silenced my responses and voice to keep peace, positivity and productivity going. I reflect on this often. I get very angry with myself for not standing up for the ideas and concepts I wanted to bring to the table, but I must say today I find there is more space for women to be heard. I lived in fear that if I spoke up or spoke out, someone/they would take away this incredible dream of creating that I had committed all my energy to, and I never wanted to risk that. Now I'm finding a

new balance between being heard and not ignoring the obvious power plays around me. It might have simply come with maturity and experience, or, simply, the industry is now open-minded.

There is still a long road ahead for all perspectives and voices to be heard, seen and shared on the big and little screen. The momentum must not stop. Let's face it: hard facts are simply a reflection of where we are and how much room there is left to grow. In 2018, of the top-grossing 100 films, women directors comprised 4 per cent, and the incline is as slow as molasses (Women and Hollywood). That being said, I do think there are several initiatives in place to help young new female directors learn the craft and be supported as they enter the field. This did not exist when I started making films. If the younger generation in North America—where we are at least moving forward, compared to the global picture—are still surprised to see a female director on set, it still matters.

The entertainment industry has given us this platform. I feel it's important that we keep leading the charge and saying that every voice matters. Every gender, every age, every ethnicity—all voices should be heard and heard equally. Every day something reminds me how important it still is to be a champion of that, to keep the momentum from slowing down.

April Mullen is an award-winning director, actor and producer. Her extensive directing credits include films Below Her Mouth (with an all-female crew) and Dead Before Dawn 3D (which made her the youngest and first female to direct a stereoscopic feature), and television series Wynonna Earp, Lethal Weapon and The Rookie. She is currently at work on Wander, a thriller starring Aaron Eckhart and Heather Graham. Born in Niagara Falls, she now lives in Los Angeles.

TIME TO CHANGE THE SCRIPT FOR BIPOC WOMEN by Tonya Williams

The Me Too movement was launched in 2006 by Tarana Burke to bring attention to the sexual harassment and sexual assault that Black, Indigenous, People of Colour (BIPOC) women were facing in their workplaces and personal lives. It wasn't until 2017, when multiple white women appropriated the term with allegations against Harvey Weinstein, that the media finally took notice. Since then, the #MeToo tsunami has toppled some of the biggest names in the business, but along the way the plight of the BIPOC women got lost.

A recent study showed that BIPOC women are less likely to have their allegations believed, by not only men, but white women as well. The stigma for racially diverse women is as strong and as healthy as it's ever been. Why is that?

We can agree that sexual harassment of BIPOC women has existed since the dawn of civilization, but film and television perfected it. The earliest images of BIPOC women on screen portrayed them as poor, dumb, illiterate, untrustworthy, oversexed, with low moral fortitude, brutalized and dehumanized for audiences.

Rewatch *Birth of a Nation, Porgy and Bess, Gone with the Wind, Foxy Brown* and *Monster's Ball* through my eyes. Some of the female icons we've revered. The 1920 film *Within Our Gates* highlights the plight of Black women in particular by asserting that "a woman, though a Negro, was a human being." Imagine a movie reminding people of that.

As a child, those images gave cruel classmates ammunition to tease me, gave teachers misconceptions about BIPOC students' abilities to learn, created uncomfortable atmospheres around men with preconceived ideas about what BIPOC women liked. It put me in a box not of my own devising, so my default was always a struggle and a climb to prove them wrong.

At auditions, I tired of suggestions that I give a little more "attitude," sound a little more "urban"—I know what all these code words mean. Stereotyping has to stop. We need to have frank discussions in the writing room about how BIPOC women continue to be portrayed negatively.

I envy the character of Elizabeth McCord in *Madam Secretary*. When did you see a BIPOC woman as lead on a drama series, who had a functional marriage, great kids, was professional at her job, and was not sleeping around with married men or murdering without discernment?

When I hear producers commiserate on how BIPOC women are treated in our society and industry, I am surprised that they have not connected the dots and realized that their content has been part of the problem, not the solution. Are they so lacking in empathy and judgment that they just don't see this? Or, worse than that, do they believe these stereotypes are true?

We have a long way to go to repair the damages made from the past, and I see no training or conversations that would lead me to believe that the next generation of content creators will be any different.

Solutions? We need more BIPOC women at the top, with an ability to shape and guide the conversation. We need their insight; we need to give them real power to exact change.

It is time to recognize that our content influences society. We wield a lot of power: let's use it, and share it, wisely.

Tonya Williams is an actress, producer and founder of Reelworld Film Festival. MOVING THE DIAL, ONE INITIATIVE AT A TIME

It's been two years since our industry exploded with news of the widespread abuse and misconduct from powerful men both behind and in front of the camera. Two years since we started saying *enough*. Time's up.

It's difficult to discuss workplace harassment without discussing gender discrimination—the lines bleed into one another. And we have seen multiple initiatives that seek to eradicate the latter in order to starve out the former

In late 2017, it came out that Michelle Williams was paid less than \$1,000—compared to Mark Wahlberg's \$1.5 million—for reshoots on the film *All the Money in the World*. Wahlberg went on to donate his \$1.5 million to the Time's Up legal defence fund, and this year, Michelle took to Capitol Hill to fight for equal pay with the Paycheck Fairness Act: same job, same pay.

Several months after the fabulous Frances McDormand's memorable "inclusion rider" Oscar speech in 2018, Warner Bros became the first major Hollywood studio to launch a company-wide diversity policy.

This past January, the Annenberg Inclusion Initiative, in partnership with Time's Up, launched the "4 per cent challenge" in the US. The challenge is quite simple: announce your commitment to work with a female director on a feature film in the next 18 months. Why 4 per cent? From 2007 to 2018, only 4 per cent of the top 1,200 grossing feature films were directed by women.

Women in Film & Television International (WIFTI) teamed up with global post-production company Chimney with 10 Percent for 50/50 (#5050TOGETHER). Production companies receive a 10 per cent discount from participating service providers if their production is gender balanced. Comweb Corp/William F. White International Inc. was the first Canadian company to join the movement, and I hope to see others follow their lead. As well, in October, WIFTI (supported by the Walt Disney Company) will host The Power of Inclusion summit in Auckland, New Zealand, to advance the global conversation around representation.

And in Canada, this past July, The Honourable Patty Hajdu, Minister of Employment, Workforce Development and Labour, announced that the

federal government was investing \$2.8 million toward reducing workplace harassment. A large chunk of this funding will support the development of Rosa, a digital platform that connects survivors to resources.


We're not there yet. Too many companies still don't have policies, procedures or resources for reporting harassment. There are still not enough women in executive roles. There are still too many women being paid less than men for the same job. As well, there is a growing population who don't identify as men or as women, but deserve the same rights, respect and fair treatment.

But I believe the dial is moving in the right direction. Companies are slowly adopting inclusive hiring practices and developing policies and procedures for reporting misconduct. There is more talk about holding those accountable for their actions, and supporting the survivors who have bravely come forward. And there is more education on prevention.

We are grateful to those at the forefront of this change, and impatient for more to commit to it. And I believe we can be hopeful. Hopeful that we are moving towards eradicating sexual harassment in the workplace. Hopeful that we are moving towards gender parity and equal pay for everyone. And hopeful that, regardless of who you are, you will be treated fairly, respected and celebrated.

As goes the BC Producers Branch, so goes the national association.

Since its founding in 1994, the CMPA's BC Producers Branch (also known as CMPA-BC) has developed a habit of being the first to the party. For 25 years, the branch has shone a light on the CMPA's path. From labour negotiations to increased female representation on the board, CMPA-BC has led the charge on many fronts, both for the national association and for the media production industry at large. It's also witnessed, firsthand, the most explosive growth in media production this country has ever seen.

British Columbia now boasts a \$3.6 billion production industry, but Harold Tichenor, one of the founding producers of CMPA-BC, recalls a very different province. When he was producing the classic family adventure show *Danger Bay* in the mid-1980s, "the industry was almost dead," he recalls. "We were the only show shooting in town. One little Canadian show. At that point, people would say that Vancouver could only support maybe two TV movies at a time. How many can it support now? Thirty? It's unbelievable what has happened here"

The formal creation of the BC Producers Branch coincided with BC's own coming of age as a production powerhouse—arguably, one helped usher in the other.


According to Tichenor, by the early 1990s, producers in BC were feeling left out in the cold. Telefilm Canada and CBC were focusing on Toronto as the country's major production hub. After all, Hollywood works because it's all in one place, right?

"Don't forget that the movie industry started in New Jersey and then moved to Hollywood," chuckles Tichenor.

He and his fellow producers felt the need to stand up and be counted. Outside of Ontario, BC has the largest cohort of independent producers in Canada, but their distance from the industry's "centre" in Toronto made the creation of a semi-autonomous branch desirable.

"As much as we were separate in some ways, I felt we had to be part of the Canadian lobby," says Tichenor, who sat on the original board of the BC Producers Branch, along with producers Matthew O'Connor, Julia Keatley and Richard Davis.

The branch's first coordinator, Dee-Dee Pincott, paints a charming picture of what it was like to steer the ship in the mid-'90s. At the time, Vancouver's industry was beginning to blossom. Production company interns were couriering the day's video tapes by plane to Los Angeles. *The X-Files*, filmed in Vancouver, was hitting its stride. And Pincott was drumming up membership from branch headquarters, a house on Howe Street.



"It was just me and an enormous fax machine in a room in this house. I did everything by fax," she laughs. "I did have a blocky old computer that I had had in university. I rented it to the branch for \$20 a month."

Membership was small at first, but according to Pincott, "Harold [Tichenor] and the rest of the board worked incredibly hard to get people on side, saying, 'We have a voice. And the greater our number, the bigger and louder our voice.' And it worked."

Some of CMPA-BC's earliest wins were advocating for the establishment of a film tax-credit system in BC—one of the first in Canada—and negotiating labour agreements with the unions and guilds. But even getting a place at the table for those negotiations was no cakewalk, according to Tichenor.

Eyeing a production boom on the horizon, the provincial government planned to meet with the US studios to formalize agreements with the ACTRA, IATSE and Teamsters unions. At first, the local producers were not invited. "So we basically threw a big snit, and the government finally agreed that one rep from the local industry could sit at the table and have equal voting power with the American studios," explains Tichenor. He was designated the rep, and went on to show the Los Angeles reps—all studio lawyers—how a BC producer handled negotiations.

"They didn't really know what day-to-day production was like. They wanted to create a model that would emulate how things were done in Los Angeles. That was their standard line: 'In LA, this is how we do it.' And my standard line became, 'But you're now in Canada, and this is how we do it,'" Tichenor says. "Most of my work was negotiating with the Americans behind the scenes to get them to understand how we work in Canada and our relationship to our unions. I think we always had a much more cooperative way of doing things."

The BC Producers Branch of today is well respected by all industry stakeholders ("Whenever media or decision makers want to talk to industry people in British Columbia about issues or developments, we're certainly on their list," says Liz Shorten, Vice-President, Operations & Member Services). Because of its reputation today, it's difficult to imagine the branch needing to elbow its way to the negotiating table. But that respect had to start somewhere. Pincott recalls that, after the successful labour negotiations, membership climbed to 20, then to 50, then kept on growing. "It was pretty exciting," she says.

Over the past decade, when it comes to industry relations, CMPA-BC has continued to be "the adult in the room," in the words of producer Brian Hamilton. Hamilton, who is a principal of Omnifilm Entertainment and today sits on the CMPA's national board, was chair of the CMPA-BC board for three years. He recalls that the last time the BC government revisited its tax-credit system, it was to reduce it by 5 per cent. But instead of unilaterally changing things, the government consulted industry first.

"Trusting CMPA-BC to be a rational partner, the government set up a dialogue with us and with MPPIA [the Motion Picture Production Industry Association] to make sure we understood the challenge they were facing and that we could all agree on a way forward," says Hamilton.

Collaborating with both government and other industry groups is a longstanding practice of the BC Producers Branch. Shorten has a theory as to why this is: "Because our members are away from the centre—which is Toronto, of course, for English-language production—they have always had to be entrepreneurial and collaborative. Not only with each other, but with the whole community. CMPA-BC is part of a larger group of industry stakeholders who market the province together. We do professional development together. Our relationship with the unions and guilds is very collaborative. And we participate in government relations together."

Case in point: Creative BC. This umbrella organization supports and promotes the province's film, television, music, interactive digital media, and book and magazine publishing industries. It was formed by the provincial government in 2013, but it wasn't an imposition. Rather, "it was the industry sectors getting together as a creative economy that motivated government to re-envision an organization with a wider remit. In BC, industry put the idea in government's head. Our creative industries were already working together," says Hamilton.

Another more recent example is the Pacific Screenwriting Program, an initiative backed by Creative BC, CMPA-BC, the Writers Guild of Canada and Netflix. The program aims to train local screenwriters and connect them with local producers and agents.

"So many people have said to me over the last couple of years, 'Why is the producers association putting money into training writers?" says Shorten. "But of course, if we don't have great writers to partner with, we're at a competitive disadvantage in British Columbia. Producers and writers in the community approached us to say, 'We've got an issue. Can you help us solve it?"

According to Hamilton, especially over the past decade, the BC Producers Branch has become something of an innovator, testing initiatives in British Columbia before they're rolled out nationally. Among these initiatives: a database of shows being made in the province, a focus on export development that has "inspired and multiplied initiatives at the national level," and an active effort to achieve gender balance on the board.

All of CMPA-BC's innovation and collaboration has been to the good of the national organization, of course. From advocating for tax-credit systems in other provinces to advising on industrial relations, the CMPA has worked in tandem with the BC Producers Branch to build a robust association for producers across the country.

"The CMPA has three separate offices, but not three separate silos," says Hamilton. "People in Toronto and Ottawa respect what the Vancouver folks are doing, and vice versa. There's a sharing on everything from HR to strategic planning."


He goes on: "My involvement with the CMPA comes from the basic observation that producing is really hard. Our job is so full of noes and long odds and huge obstacles that I wanted to feel like I wasn't alone. I believe that we're stronger together."

In BC, there are 25 years of achievements that prove it.


