From the CEO

It's hard to resist an underdog story. Particularly the variety where a team of unlikely misfits rises from obscurity to win it all. Of course, they must first learn to work together for the good of the group—cue the musicdriven montage (I've got Tom Cochrane's "Life Is a Highway" playing in my head right now!). For an animated, ultra-Canuck version of this story, check out our article on the Crave series Super Team Canada (page 20).

Over the last year, we've seen a groundswell of support by Canadians for all things homegrown: from grocery shelves to screens big and small. One example: REEL CANADA's CanFilmDay in April—one day to celebrate and screen Canadian films—had its biggest year yet, with close to 2.6 million Canadians watching a Canadian movie at home or at the thousands of screenings held across the country and around the world.

All of this is to the good. Our industry is worth celebrating and fighting for, so it's encouraging to see this embraced by so many. But it's the team-building montage that kept coming to mind as I reviewed this issue of Indiescreen.

The importance of collaboration crops up again and again in these pages. In my conversation with CBC's Marie-Philippe Bouchard ("Strong signals," page 26), we spoke about the critical need for collaboration between the CBC and independent producers. Bouchard says a public broadcaster without the risk-taking and creativity of independent producers is unimaginable. I certainly agree.

In "Watch party" on page 23, you can read about the Network of Independent Cinema Operators (NICE), a coalition of indie movie theatres—true underdogs—banding together to help one another survive in a Cineplex world. NICE's new database, the Canadian Theatrical Marketplace, connects theatres to Canadian indie films that are ready and waiting to be screened. It's an inspiring grassroots project that reminds me that many things are only possible when we do them together.

In this issue, we also feature several stories about CMPA efforts to build our industry for the better. These include "Lead time" (page 58), which reflects on the 30-year impact of our National Mentorship Program, and "Globetrotters" (page 62), which highlights our recent efforts to create

international opportunities for domestic producers. Both articles showcase ways in which the CMPA strives to help producers build connections in the industry—because, as we all know, it is these personal connections on which success in this sector depends.

I recently celebrated my 10th anniversary as president and CEO of the CMPA, and looking back at my time in this role, I can safely say that each year has been more intense than the last. Consider the hurdles we have, as an industry, overcome together: from our decade-long fight to secure the Online Streaming Act, to resurrecting production at the peak of the pandemic, to doing the hard and essential work of ensuring that Canadian content is "Canadian" in the broadest, deepest and most meaningful sense of the term. Let's just say that it's never been dull!

And then there's this past year, which has been a strange one, to say the least. The threats to our economic well-being, and our very sovereignty as a country, have been sobering. They are also incredibly motivating.

The need to stand up for local stories has never been greater. Check out "Go, Canada!" on page 16 to hear how producers are embracing this moment. And be sure to read "State of the arts" on page 30, where Stephen Guilbeault, Minister of Canadian Identity and Culture, and his Australian counterpart, Tony Burke, Minister for the Arts in Australia, talk about the challenges and opportunities in defending domestic content in their respective countries. I believe that citizens—in Canada and down under—are incredibly fortunate to have federal governments that understand the importance of protecting and promoting cultural sovereignty.

So, as we look to the year ahead, let's keep our elbows up, and our arms linked.

Sanchez starts at **Hot Docs**

Hot Docs took a big stride forward with the appointment of a new executive director last March. Diana Sanchez now occupies the top job at the documentary festival, overseeing the festival, conference and market, as well as the Hot Docs Ted Rogers Cinema and year-round programming.

Sanchez certainly comes prepared for the role: her 25 years of experience includes work at film festivals around the world (TIFF, Rotterdam Film Festival, Miami Film Festival, Los Angeles Latino International Film Festival). She also founded the International Film Festival of Panama, to promote the cinema of Central America and the Caribbean.

"I'm thrilled to be joining the Hot Docs team at such a pivotal moment," said Sanchez at the time of her hire. "Hot Docs is stepping into an exciting new chapter—one of growth, transformation and renewed vision. As documentary cinema continues to evolve, I'm eager to champion bold voices, embrace fresh ideas and foster meaningful connections-both within our local community and across the global documentary landscape."



A royal(ty) welcome

Navigating the world of royalties is complex, but leaving money on the table is not an option, especially in this economy! For producers, it goes without saying that the Canadian Retransmission Collective (CRC)—which collects and distributes Canadianterritory royalties from cable and satellite transmitters—is an important organization.

So it also goes without saying that president and CEO of CRC is an important position: one that's recently been taken up by Lori Rosenberg, following a 33-year tenure by her predecessor, Carol Cooper.

With a wealth of senior management experience in the television industry under her belt, Rosenberg is well positioned for success, particularly as Cooper will be on hand in an advisory capacity to support her during the transition. For her part, Rosenberg declared her eagerness to "[contribute] to the success of CRC as it navigates change while continuing to support producers in Canada and around the world."

Founded by the CMPA in 1989, CRC has distributed over one third of a billion dollars in royalties to its affiliates—including independent Canadian producers.

Carrington takes over at DOC

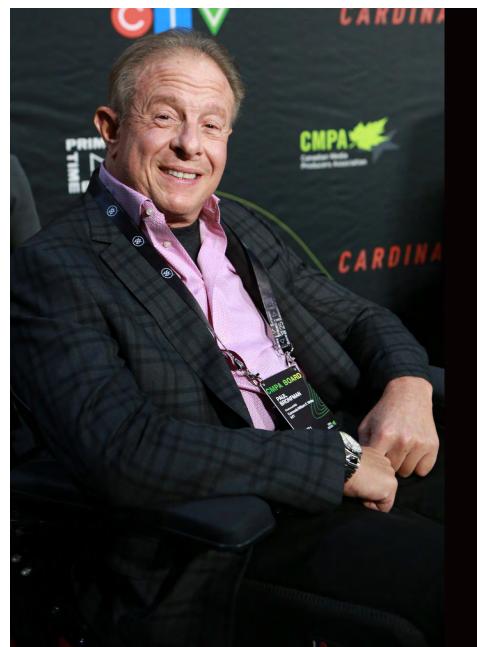
In June, Toronto-based film programmer and screen sector advocate Julian Carrington took on the executive director role at the Documentary Organization of Canada (DOC).

Trained as a lawyer and once a programmer at TIFF, Carrington has since found his home in the documentary space. He has extensive experience at Hot Docs, including curating the For Viola film series (free screenings of films that foreground BIPOC experiences) at the Hot Docs Ted Rogers Cinema. He also recently served as the managing director for the Racial Equity Media Collective (REMC).

Carrington's appointment comes at a critical time for Canada's documentary filmmakers, whose representatives, including DOC, are intent on seeing programs of national interest (PNI) protected in the Broadcasting Act. "Documentary in Canada has always been partly about nation building and about reinforcing our sense of ourselves as a country," Carrington told POV after his hire. "Recognition of non-commercial mandates to support programming that is outspoken, that is reflective of the diversity of the country—that's crucially important now."

Farewell, champion

Canada lost a titan of the screen industry this year: Paul Bronfman passed away in February at the age of 67.

Bronfman's contributions to the industry cannot be overstated. A one-time TV producer (and roadie for April Wine!), Bronfman helped launch the renowned North Shore Studios in Vancouver in 1988 (where shows from The X-Files to Battlestar Galactica were filmed). He was chairman and CEO of William F. White International, the production equipment heavyweight, from 1989 to its sale in 2019. He co-founded Filmport Studios (now Pinewood Toronto Studios) in 2007; today, it's still the largest film and TV studio in the country.

He also served on numerous boards: the Academy of Canadian Cinema & Television, the Banff Television Foundation Board, the Canadian Film Centre (CFC) and, dearest to our hearts, the CMPA. He was also a philanthropist who generously supported TIFF, Hot Docs and other film festivals.

Neither his remarkable success nor his long struggle with multiple sclerosis kept Bronfman from continuing to invest in the industry he helped build. From his professional to his charitable endeavours, he never stopped supporting emerging talent-for example, allowing young filmmakers to rent equipment from Whites at a deep discount, or funding the CFC's cinematography program for female-identifying creators.

"His impact will be felt for generations," said Reynolds Mastin, CMPA president and CEO.

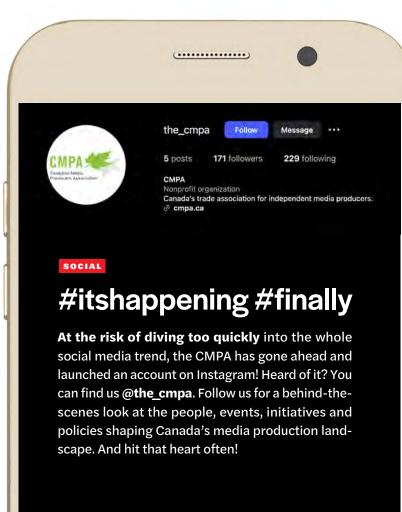
Achievement unlocked

Guillermo del Toro has lavished so much praise on Toronto over the years, the city finally decided to just give him the key already.

Seriously, though, the Oscar-winning Mexican director/producer/screenwriter has long been a vocal champion of Toronto's excellencies as a filmmaking centre: the studios, the crews, the vibe. He's been filming there since 1997's Mimic; other notable projects include Pacific Rim (2013), The Shape of Water (2017), Nightmare Alley (2021) and the anthology series Cabinet of Curiosities (2022). All eyes are on his next made-in-Toronto project, Frankenstein, which has its North American premiere at TIFF and is scheduled for release in November 2025.

Toronto mayor Olivia Chow presented del Toro with the prestigious Key to the City at the waterfront Cinespace Studios, which is renaming four sound stages after him.

"I have loved Toronto for so many years and I am very happy that it loves me back," he gushed at the ceremony. Indeed, Toronto couldn't love him more.



VALUES

A powerful statement

It's important to stand up for what you believe in. There's power in numbers.

Dozens of the country's media organizations went all in on these two axioms with the Canadian Screen Industry Statement of Values, announced at the Banff World Media Festival in June. Signatories (now more than 100 of them!) comprise broadcasters, distributors, funders, guilds, equity-focused organizations and professional associations (including the CMPA).

As organizations in many industries stealthily roll back their commitments to diversity, equity and inclusion, this statement of values represents a decisive step in a forward direction. It also represents another value in short supply these days: unity. According to Joan Jenkinson, CEO of the Black Screen Office (BSO), "We didn't just write a statement—we built consensus."

Christa Dickenson, CEO of CPAC, agrees that the statement "is a reflection of the principles we want to live by as an industry. Not just in words, but in action, through hiring, partnerships, content, and culture."

Blue Ant goes public

Plot twist! In August, privately held Blue Ant Media completed a "reverse takeover" of publicly held Boat Rocker Media. Blue Ant began trading on the Toronto Stock Exchange under the new ticker "BAMI," while Boat Rocker returned to its previous life as a private, independent studio.

As part of the deal, Blue Ant acquired the animation studio Jam Filled Entertainment, as well as the studios Insight Productions (*The Amazing Race Canada*, *Top Chef Canada*) and Proper Television (*The Great Canadian Baking Show*).

According to CEO Michael MacMillan, the merger will initiate the company's "next phase of growth as a modern, global media business" and allow it to "scale in a rapidly evolving landscape." "Rapidly evolving" is kind of Blue Ant's thing—we're confident this latest move will bring more success.

On the Boat Rocker side, company co-founders David Fortier and Ivan Schneeberg, along with longtime partner John Young, completed a management buyout of the Boat Rocker Studios business, which included its remaining scripted, unscripted, kids and family divisions, as well as its global distribution business, brand and franchise group, and creative partnerships arm.

"This exciting next chapter gives us the independence and flexibility to continue bringing compelling and entertaining stories to audiences around the world across all genres and platforms," said Fortier, Schneeberg and Young in a joint statement.

2025: A year of milestones

A golden age

It's normal to slow down a bit when one hits the big 5-0, but try telling TIFF. The film festival, which reaches the half-century mark this year, is only becoming stronger and more agile with age.

TIFF: The Market is slated to make its debut in 2026, with the potential to transform the wildly popular festival into a global industry centrepiece. This week-long content market, bolstered by \$23 million in federal funding, will bring "dealmakers, talent and audiences together in a new, much bigger way," says CEO Cameron Bailey.

Even as the festival forges ahead, this birthday has clearly put TIFF in a reflective mood: celebrations included summer-long screenings of 50 feature films that tell the story of TIFF, from Dead Ringers to Slumdog Millionaire. May the next 50 years be marked by skyrocketing sales, buzzy red carpets and, of course, remarkable movies.





Belated birthday bashery

After taking a one-year hiatus to focus on growth and program development, imagineNATIVE Film + Media Arts Festival came back in force this summer, with a reason to celebrate: it turned 25 years young!

The festival also shifted its timing from October to June, to coincide with Indigenous Peoples Month—and to escape the crowded fall festival season. All the better for imagineNATIVE to showcase its packed lineup: loads of distinctive full-length films (from Pete and Seth Scriver's animated documentary Endless Cookie, produced by Scythia Films, to Kaniehtiio Horn's horror comedy Seeds) alongside a wide array of thought-provoking shorts.

Summer, autumn, this year, last year—if you're the world's biggest Indigenous media arts festival, you can celebrate your birthday whenever you want.

Cheers to 25 years, **Eagle Vision**

This year, Winnipeg-based, Indigenous-owned prodco Eagle Vision marked 25 years of courageous storytelling—while managing to look as fresh as the day it was founded.

Founded by Anishinaabe filmmaker Lisa Meeches (and run by Meeches and co-owners Kyle Irving and Rebecca Gibson), Eagle Vision has earned acclaim for its unflinching portrayal of injustices (Taken, We Were Children) as well as its work on far-reaching feature films and television series (from preschool program Tipi Tales to Oscar-winning Capote to Manitoba-centric legal series Burden of Truth). Throughout its history, the company has prioritized changemaking through its content, and has beaten a path for a new generation of Indigenous-led production companies.

And it's not done yet. Eagle Vision continues to evolve through forays into exciting new territory, from Snapchat docuseries and video games to distribution and business affairs. Nobody does it like you, Eagle Vision—congratulations on a quarter-century!

A reel visionary

Tonya Williams certainly has staying power.

She's been in the industry, on screen or behind the scenes, for some 50 years. And 2025 marks a quarter-century since she founded Reelworld, the BIPOC-centred film festival and screen institute she continues to run.

Reelworld's achievements to date are staggering:

- Over 400 Reelworld Awards have been given to deserving Indigenous, Black, Asian and South Asian individuals for their work in the screen industry.
- More than 1,450 films by BIPOC creators have been screened at the Reelworld Film Festival.
- More than 8,600 people have participated in Reelworld's year-round programming, which provides professional development opportunities for Canada's racially diverse talent.
- Access Reelworld, a database of more than 7,000 BIPOC members of the screen industry, was launched in 2020.

This year, Williams not only received a star on Canada's Walk of Fame, but she was also inducted into the Order of Canada—fitting recognition of her lifelong contributions to Canadian cultural identity and her tireless work to amplify marginalized stories and creatives.

Williams said she "share[s] this honour with every artist, every advocate, and every underrepresented voice who continues to push this country forward."

Watch your languages

Since hitting the airwaves in 1999 as the world's first Indigenous broadcaster, APTN has made a habit of breaking new ground in Canada's media landscape: from the first-ever Indigenous-language broadcast of the Olympics to the first-ever Indigenous-focused streaming service, APTN lumi. And, of course, there's the homegrown regular programming—like recent hit series Bones of Crows and North of North—that proudly champions Indigenous narratives and culture, making APTN a model for Indigenous broadcasters around the globe.

The network's latest milestone is another biggie. In fall 2024, to celebrate its 25th birthday, APTN launched APTN Languages, a new channel featuring only Indigenous languages. Of the more than 70 Indigenous languages across Canada, only Cree, Inuktitut and Anishinaabemowin are stable, so the launch is a promising development for revitalization—and normalization—efforts. The channel also provides an exciting new platform for Indigenous independent producers eager to make projects in traditional languages.

"This initiative is a powerful testament to our commitment to cultural conservation and storytelling," said APTN CEO Monika Ille. "This moment marks a new era of representation and recognition for Indigenous voices."

Forty and fabulous

Major events in 1984: The Macintosh personal computer was launched. Jeanne Sauvé was appointed as Canada's first female governor general. And Women in Film & Television - Toronto (WIFT+ Toronto) was founded.

Open to all people, regardless of gender expression, WIFT+ Toronto's membership now consists of over 1,000 screen-based professionals, from senior executives to creatives to crew, at all stages of their careers.

At the 2024 edition of TIFF, WIFT+ Toronto held a swinging reception celebrating four decades of advancing the careers of its members in the screenbased media industry. That's 40 years of working tirelessly to build an equitable, accessible and inclusive industry in Toronto.

In just the past 10 years, WIFT+ Toronto has doubled its annual programming, which includes courses and professional development, mentorship and peer support. And in the last five years, the organization has awarded more than \$80,000 in prizes at its annual Showcase, which spotlights short projects.





A maritime milestone

The Atlantic International Film Festival (AIFF) has been running swimmingly for 45 years now, and it has much to be proud of:

- Apart from its inaugural year as a fledgling festival in PEI, AIFF has spent its entire life in Halifax, and become an annual institution in that fine city.
- For 28 years, it's hosted AIFF Partners, a top international co-production market that has launched many fruitful
- The festival provides a fantastic platform for local creators (one example: Nova Scotian filmmaker Kevin Hartford has had a film in the festival for 10 years running).
- Alongside great Canadian lineups, it's screened major international titles, including films that took Best Picture at the Oscars (Moonlight, Parasite and Anora are three recent examples).

Shooting for success

In 1990, the DGC Ontario District Council was a scrappy group of around 300 directors, all with side hustles and still shooting on Super 16. Thirty-five years later, DGC Ontario represents a diverse membership of nearly 4,000 and is a key player in the province's powerhouse screen industry.

The guild's evolution mirrors Ontario's staggering growth as a production centre. Says Reynolds Mastin, president and CEO of the CMPA, "Ontario is home to some of the world's best film and television directors and crew, largely because of the exceptional work of DGC Ontario in supporting its members and the industry overall, as well as investing in the next generation of talent. Over the past 35 years, the strong partnership between producers, Directors, and skilled crew has made a significant economic impact and helped position Ontario as a global centre for film and television production."

Many happy returns

This year, the Canada Media Fund's birthday cake is sporting 15 candles! Established through a public-private partnership between the Department of Canadian Heritage and the cable industry, the fund has accomplished much in a relatively short time:

- It's provided funding for thousands of film, TV and digital media projects across every province and territory.
- It's invested \$6 billion and attracted more than \$3 billion in foreign investment and sales.
- It's generated a whopping \$24 billion in economic activity in Canada.

As a distributor, a major concern for us in the changing market is that we ensure a future where Canadian IP remains Canadian controlled, and early investment in feature films is encouraged and incentivized. Without support for independent producers within Canada, we risk losing our best talent.

Canadian feature films give new and diverse voices a chance to share their stories on a global scale.

Ensuring a healthy film ecosystem is not only critical for the thousands of Canadians who work in the film industry, but for all Canadians who deserve the opportunity to see their vibrant culture reflected on screen. Taking control

The CEO of the Indigenous Screen Office gives her take on what the current "elbows up" moment means for Indigenous screen content in Canada

Indigenous storytellers in the film and television industry in Canada have been fighting for narrative sovereignty for decades. This struggle for rights, autonomy and self-determination is an extension of the larger fight for Indigenous sovereignty, as verified by treaty and in law.

Sovereignty is perhaps one of those things you don't really think about until it's threatened—and for Indigenous people, sovereignty in all its forms has been under attack for more than two centuries.

In recent months, Canadians are starting to see the imperative of fighting for our national sovereignty. They are starting to understand that narrative sovereignty is grounded in our actual

sovereignty, and that storytelling is key to cultural independence and cultural autonomy. They are starting to feel what Indigenous peoples have been talking about this whole time and the urgency of this fight.

Over the last five years, Indigenous storytellers have experienced some long overdue opportunities, in large part due to new funding in the system for Indigenous screen content through the ISO. But behind that is decades of persistent advocacy by the Indigenous screen community and industry.

This advocacy has long been focused on narrative sovereignty: the ability to control the storytelling and receive the economic benefits that emerge from the content, wherever it is sold and distributed. Put another way, IP ownership is central to the definition of Indigenous content. And since the ISO, as a funder, doesn't have the resources to support the entire Indigenous screen industry in creating that content, it is crucial that the entire industry is aligned on that definition. This means that money will flow to Indigenous storytellers and their companies, and that economic reconciliation will also be part of the conversation around narrative sovereignty.

At the ISO's latest CRTC intervention in May 2025, the ISO argued strongly against proposed cuts to programs of national interest (PNI), which we believe will lead to a devastating loss of support for Canadian long-form documentaries and

drama. These types of national programs are critical vehicles for Indigenous storytelling and narrative sovereignty and are already at risk in an increasingly consolidated and homogenized market.

The argument we have been making for the necessity for narrative sovereignty, as well as ownership and control, in the Indigenous context is clearly just as urgent for the broader Canadian broadcasting ecosystem, of which we are an important part.

We have seen the benefits and rewards of prioritizing and investing in Indigenous storytelling and talent: what emerges are compelling stories that people are excited about and want to watch. Take the new series *North of North*—a great example



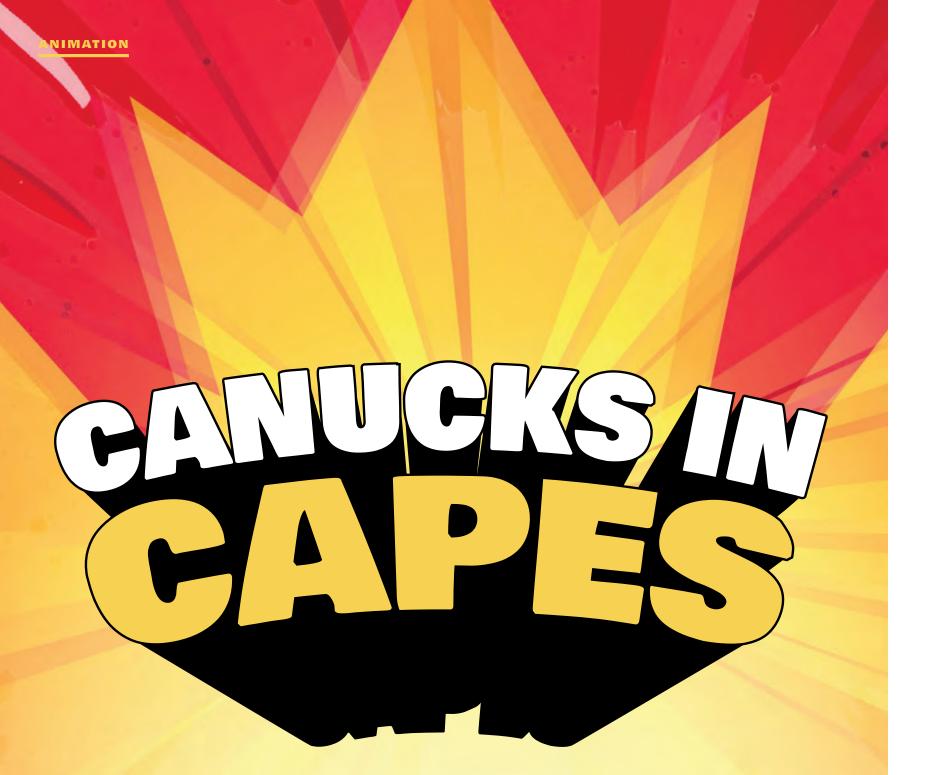

of unique contemporary storytelling with a universal global appeal, and a demonstration of the broadcasting system coming together as an ecosystem to support a project.

ISO is thrilled that we have eight of our funded feature films at TIFF this year, showcasing the breadth of talent of the Indigenous filmmaking community. These films come from across Canada, from a diversity of Indigenous peoples and nations, and exemplify the expansive possibilities of Indigenous storytelling, innovation and leadership, all of which are more urgent than ever.

Years in the making, Atomic Cartoons' animated show about overlooked über-Canadian superheroes could hardly have dropped at a more auspicious time



Has there ever been a more self-consciously Canadian show than Super Team Canada? A show that not only skips merrily through fields of disrequires its audience to, as Canadians are said to be uniquely able to do, laugh at themselves for an episode's entire could not be more slyly patriotic. 10-minute duration?

episode "The Pooch Pack Goes Wack," for example, the show manages to poke fun at tax credits, The Guess Who, PAW body knows our cartoons are specifically designed to appeal to only children and simpletons," intones the country's leader, voiced by Kevin McDonald (Kids in the Hall).

Certainly, Canada is better known for animated preschool shows featuring anthropomorphic pups than it is for animated shows for adults. Crave's first-ever original animated Within the first two minutes of the series premiered in May, and is the brainchild of Calgary-born, LA-based brothers Joel M. Cohen ("Not the Joel Coen you want," he jokes) and Robert Patrol, and itself—or, at least, the idea of Cohen. Self-deprecation aside, these a Canadian cartoon for adults. "Every- Cohen brothers are hardly slouches: Joel is a writer and producer who's worked on Saturday Night Live; Robert's long list of writing and producing credits includes The Big Bang Theory. Both have written for *The Simpsons*. Both

have won Emmys—which Robert has also written for.

The show's concept—a squad of lowrent Canadian superheroes is called in to save the world after all other superheroes have been vanquished—was borne of COVID restlessness, and the script was written on spec. The brothers decided to make it an entirely Canadian production, "because we love the Canadian system so much, and because the normal way of pitching animated shows in the States is not that appealing," says Joel.

They reached out to their friend Will Arnett (Arrested Development), who quickly agreed to play the concussion-addled ex-minor hockey hero Breakaway. Arnett's production company, Electric Avenue, also jumped in.

Then Cobie Smulders (How I Met Your world. It was perfect timing. Silver lining Mother) signed on to play Niagara Falls, the group's hydro-powered leader. Atomic Cartoons said yes. Crave said yes. Other voices signed on: Brian Drummond as Sasquatchewan, a nonverbal Bigfoot; Veena Sood as RCM-PC, a sensitive cyborg; Ceara Morgana as Chinook, a preteen First Nations superhero; Charles Demers as Poutine, a French-Canadian crimefighter who blasts curds and hot gravy out of his potato cannons; and, of course, Kevin McDonald as

on the world falling apart."

The Cohens, long used to working south of the border, are effusive about both their production partners and the collaborative process itself.

"Crave has been phenomenal and really supportive," says Joel. "When either they or Atomic have notes for us, they're really smart. It's actually been a very, very easy process, and much different than it would have been were we doing this in the US."

And then, after years in the lab, the show was unleashed on the country at an extraordinarily fortuitous moment: a moment in which the American president's annexation overtures had Canadians shaking off their collective apathy and digging up that old Molson commercial. A show about unabashedly Canadian superheroes was exactly what the doctor ordered.

"The thing that is absolutely the worst turn of events for the planet ended up being great for us," deadpans Robert. "We never wanted it to be a political show, but I love the 'elbows up' pride that Canadians are feeling. That pride is, in an odd way, kind of what we felt when we were first talking about the idea of the show during COVID."

"We're very proud Canadians, and we've always tried to do stuff in Canada and with other Canadians," says Joel. "The timing of the show's release was a complete coincidence, but great luck for us. Crave was supportive enough to crank out some promos that were tied into the political environment, and I think that helped get us noticed. But, for us, we were just really excited about doing a show in Canada."

Alex Cichon, producer at Atomic, adds: "It was the perfect storm: looming trade war, the federal election in Canada, and just everything happening around the

From Atomic's viewpoint, "We just tried to bottle Rob and Joel as much as we could," says Cichon. "We wanted their voice on screen, and tried to partner them with good people who would deliver on that."

The partnership is paying off, as Super Team Canada has already begun to win awards—if not yet an Emmy, at least a couple Leo Awards, given to BC film and TV productions. The show won Best Animation Series, and Brian Drummond, who voices Sasquatchewan, grunted his way to a Best Voice Performance award. And it's just getting started. The show has the go-ahead for season two, which is scheduled for release in 2026. The team of absurdist, unlikely superheroes will live to fight another day.

When asked which of these heroes they enjoy most, the Cohens and Cichon are diplomatic. Joel loves the PM, but appreciates Poutine's characterization and Drummond's work on Sasquatchewan. Robert admires Breakaway's jackassery, but thinks Niagara Falls might be the winner for him. Cichon is "a sucker" for Poutine, but admits Chinook has her moments throughout the season.

"Look at us, just giving the most politically correct answer, covering everybody," says Joel. After all, what could be more Canadian than refusing to coalesce behind a single strong identity?

"It's not a melting pot," affirms Robert. "It's a mosaic." "



tough out there for an independent cinema. Theatregoing dropped off a cliff during the pan-

demic, and with the rise of films on streaming services, it's never fully recovered. The country's theatrical market is also one of the most consolidated in the world; in 2024, Cineplex accounted for 73 per cent of Canada's box office share. Compare that figure to the US, the UK and Australia, where a single theatre chain has captured no more than 30 per cent of the market.

It's equally tough out there for an independent film. "Theatrically, not that many films are finding audiences, period," says Andy Willick, who owns two independent cinemas: the By Towne Cinema in Ottawa and the Fox Theatre in Toronto. "A lot of small films are getting lost. For Canadian films, it's that much more difficult." Independent producers know this all too well and have to hustle harder than ever to get their projects seen on the big screen.

Take the 2024 movie Paying for It (Hawkeye Pictures, Wildling Pictures), based on Canadian cartoonist Chester Brown's graphic novel about his experiences with sex workers. The producers used a DIY, slow-release micro-distribution model for the film: travelling from city to city, screening in independent cinemas, festival venues and some multiplexes, with director Sook-Yin Lee, Brown and cast presences as an added draw. Nearly nine months after its theatrical release, the movie is still being booked and filling venues.

In order to locate and get in touch with independent cinemas, the film's producers worked with the Network of Independent Cinema Exhibitors (NICE), a group of indie cine-

mas across the country. NICE represents everything from "retro summer drive-ins to beautiful old heritage buildings to downtown art houses," says Sonya Yokota William, NICE's director. "Independent cinemas in Canada have really come

together, and we have a strong culture of supporting each other. We meet once a month on Zoom to talk about the state of the industry and our concerns, everything from building insurance to people throwing things at the screen during Minecraft movies," says William.

NICE also has an active message board, one on which members are often asking where a certain film can be found, or who holds the rights. "Through my access to the message board, I noticed that theatre owners had really amazing ideas about, say, bringing out an old title to celebrate a special anniversary," says Hawkeye's Aeschylus Poulos. "Sometimes, that information wasn't easy for them to track down."

Enter NICE's new Canadian Theatrical Marketplace: a digital database of Canadian films (marketplace.nicecinema.ca) that connects independent cinemas with their rightsholders (typically producers). With searchable categories like genre, theme, screening format, accessibility features and so on, rightsholders are responsible for uploading information about their own films.

"There's no central place where exhibitors can go to find out what Canadian films are out there, and the Canadian Theatrical Marketplace will fill that gap," says William.

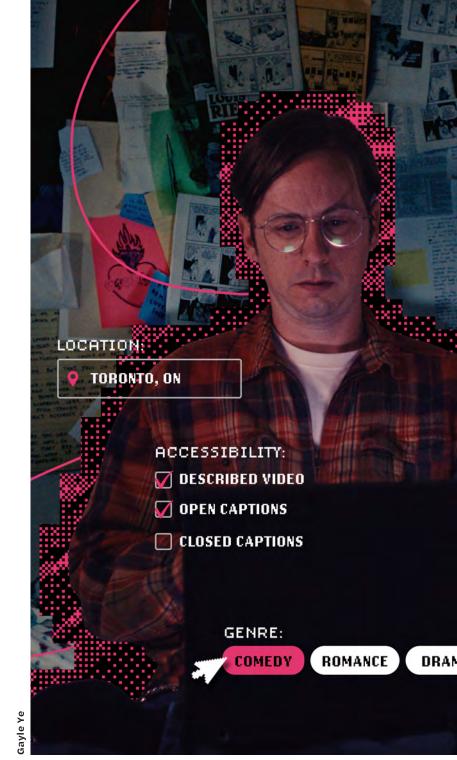
Cinema owner Willick is optimistic about the tool. "I think it could very well help us fill in holes in our programming, and to find films from different cultural communities and geographical areas more easily," he says. "I hear from my peers across Canada that some of their most successful films are, for example, documentaries from someone who's from their hometown. So if I can actually go into the database and find a doc that's specific to where I'm located, that could work really well for both filmmakers and for theatres, because we're connecting more directly."

That direct connection is what independent cinemas do best. They often have deep roots and long histories in their towns, helping owners understand what plays well with their customers. From his experience with Paying for It, Poulos observes that "the people who own these theatres really know their audience and community."

He contrasts this to the big players, which tend to only play movies with broad commercial appeal. "You go to a multiplex, and there are five to 10 films, and they're often kid movies or action movies. They're not necessarily thinking about their community and their local audience," he says. "I think this database—having access to these Canadian stories—will really give rise to an opportunity for more films to get out there and find their audience."

There are also plenty of other ways the database could be helpful. William plans to add a "curatorial aspect," selecting and showcasing films that might be suitable for, say, an upcoming holiday or commemorative occasion. She also imagines it being used by exhibitors (or any other interested individual) in other countries "who want to explore the Canadian film landscape. Having one central place that people can look for films seems like a natural solution."

Willick envisions an educational extension, where university professors use the database to find Canadian films that

they can play in class. He also believes there's a possibility streaming services might find it helpful for populating their catalogues with regional content: "You never know: streamers could go in and say, 'We need some films from this area,' or 'We need this type of film,' locate it, and contact the producer."

Whatever the database evolves into or whoever uses it down the road, it's significant that it's laying the foundation for an even stronger partnership between cinemas and producers, who have every reason to stick together.

Strong signals

The CMPA's Reynolds Mastin in conversation with CBC/Radio-Canada's Marie-Philippe Bouchard

Marie-Philippe Bouchard took the helm as president and CEO of CBC/Radio-Canada early this year, at a time when all eyes were on the public broadcaster and its future as a bastion of cultural sovereignty. Bouchard came to the role with a wealth of broadcasting experience, prepared to steer the ship through whatever storms may be looming.

As representative of hundreds of independent Canadian producers, the CMPA's president and CEO, Reynolds Mastin, has his own questions for Bouchard—around new financing models for CBC series, the shrinking kids' market, the centrality of IP ownership in the definition of Canadian content, and more. Here, the two leaders discuss what's on the industry's mind.

Reynolds Mastin: You spent the majority of your career at CBC/Radio-Canada. Then you went on to become the CEO of the broadcaster TV5 Québec Canada. So you came into this role with both an insider and an outsider perspective. Was this job what you expected, based on those experiences, or have you been surprised?

Marie-Philippe Bouchard: You're right, I was very much a child of the organization. And working across French and English services gave me an overview of the whole landscape. What I expected to find when I started this job, considering the very polarized climate around the financing of CBC, was an embattled group that had been subject to a lot of criticism. In the early days of my tenure, listening to different groups and visiting our regional stations out west, I was comforted by the many voices who were supportive of what CBC was doing.

There are also criticisms about the service that we provide. That largely stems from the fact that we have been subject to

many, many reductions of funds over the years. Also, the market has changed so much. Both English and French audiences are flooded with content. How do you make the distinctive Canadian experience stand out? That's something that we're all working and striving for.

RM: On that topic, I want to discuss the North of North model, where CBC, Netflix, APTN and producers came together to make that show. The series has been very successful, both critically and in terms of audience. Obviously a player like Netflix brings financing to the table, but they also have that global reach. Is this a model you plan to continue using in the future?

MB: North of North is a good example, but it's not isolated. In the last few years, we've been working with partners—sometimes with the foreign streamers, but also with foreign distributors and foreign broadcasters—to make quality Canadian content that will resonate with Canadians, but can also reach wider international audiences. There need to be many players at the table for that to happen.

Really, what a public broadcaster does is work with producers who have the idea and creative talent, and develop that idea for its potential. We invest. We take the risk. We greenlight the project. But we know we need more money at the table, as well as more creative input. Foreign distributors and other public broadcasters lend a perspective that enriches the production. Together, we have an opportunity to bring to light these incredible shows—but it takes many at the table. In the English market, at least, we can get that influx of funds from a partner like Netflix. That model also means figuring out how we're going to share those rights, especially with foreign streamers that are very

In the case of North of North, I want to point out that before we entered into the Netflix deal, we partnered with APTN. And that is very important: we can partner with Canadian broadcasters and share some of those rights, and this allows everybody to be able to bring their touch to the project and also to reach their particular audiences.

RM: How do you ensure that you're preserving that distinct Canadian voice, while the streaming service brings its own creative input and is thinking about an audience that goes well beyond Canada?

MB: Our philosophy is to work very closely with the producers to enable the original Canadian creative process, and to support the development of the project so that it will have legs. The project will be able to not only reach Canadian audiences and satisfy them, but also have a potential to showcase what Canadians can do and their creativity. That's our part, and we enable that with funds, with advice, and with risk-taking.

RM: That's one of the things that CBC has in common with producers: taking risks. Part of the reason producers take those risks is that they expect to be able to monetize the IP they create, which allows them to reinvest in development and make the next piece

of IP. Throughout the CRTC hearings on the Online Streaming Act, we talked a lot about the importance of Canadian IP ownership. What are your thoughts on the importance of that as one of the pillars of our modernized system?

MB: CBC has been entirely consistent in saying, very loud and clear, that Canadian content is produced by Canadians and owned by Canadians. It can include all sorts of stories, it can

be about all sorts of things, but the nature of it is that the IP is owned by Canadians, and it was produced in the key functions by Canadians. That's the best and most stable way to define it.

It's also the most sustainable way. Because we do understand that producers take risks, and they are counting on some financial upside to the life of the production over time. So we continue to need viable independent producers in Canada to be able to continue our work. The best way for that to happen is to place serious protection around the notion that the privileges of Canadian content will be awarded to those who are E Canadian, and own the content.

RM: Let's discuss the state of kids' content. I remember, in my opening remarks at Prime Time 2024, I had a special guest star, and it was the tickle trunk from Mr. Dressup. A year and a half later, people still come up to me to talk about the tickle trunk. It speaks to the power and importance of children's content, because Mr. Dressup was clearly integral to people's childhoods growing up. They have a very powerful emotional attachment to that show and to everything about that show.

As you know, we're experiencing crisis in the kids' industry at the moment. Especially in Canada, it's under enormous pressure. Going forward, what do you think CBC's role is in finding a way to rebuild and restore what was once one of the strongest

pillars of the domestic content indus-

try for Canada?

MB: Certainly, the kids' industry was a powerhouse of Canadian content production, for many, many reasons including the fact that, at that time, kids were watching a lot of conventional TV. They weren't on TikTok. They weren't on YouTube. There was a demand for kids' content and Canadian expertise. But as the cost of

animated shows continued to rise, the market sort of dissolved. Kids are now consuming all sorts of things, including programming that wasn't made for them. We are all nostalgic for how we grew up, attached to safe kids' programming made for us, compared to how our kids are now growing up.

What is the role of the CBC in all of this? We are, and we continue to be, major contributors for the kids' sector, because we commission Canadian content. We partner with a lot of foreign broadcasters, usually public broadcasters, to broadcast Canadian content not just here, but around the world. But we can't solve the contraction in the market all by ourselves.



We can't change the fact that streamers, for example, are commissioning less kids' content. But we can be steadfast in what we commission. We may need to work more with other Canadian public service broadcasters, such as the educational services in the various provinces, and across French and English, because many languages can support an animation project. I think we need to widen our partnerships. Our job is also to make sure that kids' content gets in front of kids' eyes, and that may mean commissioning content that will maybe find its way onto third-party platforms, under the safe CBC umbrella. We need to reach kids where they are.

RM: I think it's particularly important, when we're talking about kids' programming, to talk about what Canadian kids see in the Canadian programming they watch. I've heard you speak elsewhere about the need to ensure that CBC/Radio-Canada's programming fully reflects the depth and breadth of Canadian society. Can you share those thoughts here?

MB: We really want to tap into the creativity and ability of producers from across the country, and make sure that our content reflects that cultural touch that's different from the west coast to the east coast to the far north, and everywhere in between. We also need to reflect the communities from a language point of view, particularly minority languages—so our

strategy for Indigenous reflection and empowerment is really important from both a cultural and language point of view.

We are very committed to working with producers from all areas and sensibilities, and making sure that they hire talent that reflects that diversity as well. It is really about nation building, right? You feel part of the community when you know your neighbours, including the people who live a little further from where you live. And that is the magic of media: creating bridges between those distances.

This is also true between generations. Our kids and our adolescents and our young adults are thinking things that are not necessarily what their elders are thinking. Each generation needs to understand that. That's the basis of what a public broadcaster is there for: it's not to narrowcast, it's to bring people together.

RM: Again, related to the Online Streaming Act, we've talked a lot about access to our stories and what that means for Canadian content on online platforms. We're expecting a CRTC-commissioned study this fall on how Canadians find and discover content. What are your thoughts on the challenges of discoverability?

MB: Discoverability is part of how we work with producers: making sure that people are aware of the content, that it's accessible, and that it's promoted. It used to be just the broadcaster's job, but it really is work we do together with producers now—having key characters present on social media to create hype, for example.

From a regulatory point of view, we also have to have the support to make sure that those platforms that people are finding content on have responsibilities towards Canadian content to make sure that it's visible. And it's accessible. And it's promoted appropriately. We need all of those regulatory tools, and we need those relationships between broadcasters and producers, in order for content to really reach the audience that we want to reach.

RM: My sense from you is that your strategy, at least for certain kinds of shows, may include having content that was commissioned from producers by CBC not only appear on

CBC TV or Gem, but also on other platforms where audiences are. Is that a fair comment?

MB: I think we need all of it. We do need a strong core of content available on a platform like CBC Gem, because it is the destination for Canadian content. But the fact of the matter is, there are audiences that basically live on platforms like YouTube and will not be drawn elsewhere. And our responsibility as a public broadcaster is to reach Canadians where they are.

We have an awful lot of content available already on YouTube, for instance, just to speak of that platform. We have to go out and reach people where they habitually consume content, because that's where we can reach them with trusted news. That's where we can also give them a taste of Canadian comedy, of Canadian drama, of kids' shows.

RM: Last question—will partnering with independent producers continue to be critically important to CBC/Radio-Canada in fulfilling its mandate for key genres of programming?

MB: It is impossible to imagine anything else. We are the home of Canadian content. Who else is going to produce it with us, for the benefit of Canadians, but independent producers? We know that's a long-term relationship, and we want to continue to care for it.

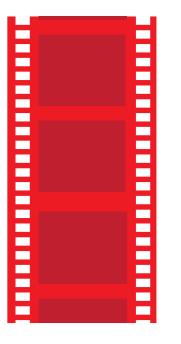

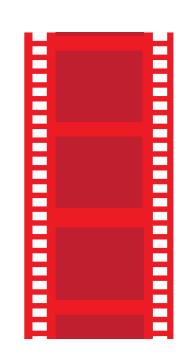

In conversation with the Honourable Steven Guilbeault



The Honourable Steven Guilbeault, Minister of Canadian Identity and Culture, is no stranger to the culture file. He was Minister of Canadian Heritage from 2019 to 2021, and while the job title—and the political landscape—has changed, Guilbeault is still going to bat for Canadian creators in a tempestuous time. He spoke with *Indiescreen* on the role of government in our "elbows up" moment and what a country can do to protect its cultural sovereignty. In light of the CMPA and Screen Producers Australia's recent joint initiative to bring Canadian and Australian producers together through Canada Connect (see page 65), we also asked the minister about the importance of teaming up with like-minded nations such as Australia.

From travel planning to grocery shopping, Canadians across the country have been very supportive of Canadian businesses, and more broadly, standing up for our national industry and cultural sovereignty. What role do you believe the media and creative industries can play in this moment of national pride, and how can government assist?

In this moment where Canadians are rallying around what makes us strong and proud, the media and cultural industries are key. Culture is not only an expression of who we are; it's a core pillar of our sovereignty and economic strength. When

our stories are told, our values are carried, and our sovereignty is affirmed.

That's why our government is using every lever available to ensure that Canadian identity and culture thrive: by supporting our creators, strengthening our official languages, promoting Indigenous knowledge, and investing in initiatives like the Canada Strong Pass, which gives Canadians greater access to our national parks, railroads, museums and historic sites this summer. These places and experiences are what bring us together, and they're living embodiments of Canadian identity and pride.

We believe that cultural policy is economic policy, and through targeted investments, updated legislation, and incentives for domestic and international co-productions, we are ensuring that Canadian culture is not only protected, but promoted, at home and abroad.

Canada has nearly 60 co-production treaties and memoranda of understanding with other nations, and Canadian producers have a strong track record of working across borders with producers in other countries to get projects developed, produced, sold and seen. What role do you see government playing to ensure creative export of Canadian content remains strong and continues to grow?



Canada's cultural sector is stronger when it is connected—not just coast to coast to coast, but also globally. Our co-production agreements are more than paperwork; they are creative bridges. Our government remains committed to deepening these partnerships, especially with like-minded countries such as Australia.

We need to work together to tackle today's challenges in a fast-changing world, such as artificial intelligence and algorithmic biases. Canada has been a leader at international fora like UNESCO, the G7, the OECD and the OIF in pushing for a fair, diverse and transparent digital cultural space.

By supporting Canadian content creators through exportready programs, increasing international promotion via Telefilm and the Canada Media Fund, and leading coordinated action on international cultural policy, we are ensuring that Canada's voice is heard at home and abroad.

How do you think Canadian content resonates with global audiences?

Canada has a lot to offer to the world. Our country reflects a diversity of experiences and values that are meaningful to many beyond its borders. Our country is home to Indigenous creators, newcomers, artists from all corners of the country, and voices in both official languages. That breadth

of experience and unique identities shapes the stories we tell.

Whether it's the powerful drama *Maid*, filmed in Victoria and showcasing the rugged beauty of the West Coast; original Québec productions like *Révolution*, *La famille Plouffe* and *Les Parent*, all created here and now adapted and loved in numerous countries around the world; *The Place That Thaws*, an Indigenous-led podcast from Canada's High Arctic; or Ontario's singer Shania Twain, the bestselling female solo artist of all time and creator of the highest-selling country album in history—Canadian content connects us, emotionally and culturally. We're proud to see this content being seen, consumed and resonating with audiences around the world.

The passing of the Online Streaming Act in 2023 was a significant step toward modernizing Canada's broadcasting framework. As the CRTC's regulatory implementation of this legislation moves forward, what is your hope for how this bill will impact Canadian stories told on screen?

Our intention is clear: we want to ensure that Canadian stories are seen, heard and valued on all platforms.

The Online Streaming Act will make sure Canadians can see themselves in the stories and music available in the new online reality, and will reinvest in future generations of artists in Canada. Online streamers are being asked to contribute to

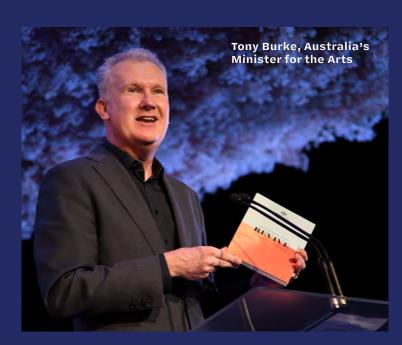

Canada and Australia's production industries have plenty in common: top-shelf film crews, diverse and stunning scenery, robust production infrastructure, large English-language audiences. They also face some of the same challenges, particularly with adapting legislative and regulatory frameworks for the digital age in the face of global streaming giants. Against the backdrop of the CMPA's partnership with Screen Producers Australia (see page 65), we reached out to the office of The Honourable Tony Burke, Minister for the Arts in Australia's current Labor government, to hear how they're handling cultural sovereignty and supporting homegrown stories down under.

The linchpin in Australia's strategy is its National Cultural Policy, called Revive. Established in 2023, Revive recognizes the role of the screen industry in supporting the nation's cultural expression, and aims to ensure its stories reach audiences in Australia and around the world. The world's first and only disability-focused broadcaster, AMI, is proving itself as accessible to producers as it is to the community it serves. Producer partners just need to follow one rule:

For a niche broadcaster, Accessible Media Inc. (AMI) boasts a

REMARKABLY BROAD AUDIENCE.

That's because AMI's mission is to entertain, inform and empower Canadians with disabilities—and with nearly 30 per cent of Canadians age 15 or older currently experiencing a disability, AMI's target audience includes approximately 8 million people across every demographic, from all over the country.

"We're one channel, so we have to be everything to everybody," acknowledges Cara Nye, AMI's director of content development and production.

AMI has come a long way since it was established in 1989 as the National Broadcast Reading Service, which operated a radio reading service before it launched The Accessible Channel in 2009. The Accessible Channel, a must-carry specialty channel that included closed captions and described video for all of its programs, evolved into AMI-tv; AMI-télé, its French-language counterpart, was launched in 2014. A fully accessible free streaming service, AMI+, was added in 2023.

As a broadcaster dedicated to accessible programming, and focused on creating and commissioning original shows focused on disability, AMI is the first and only of its kind. As such, it has developed—and continues to develop—a roster of programs as diverse as the disability community itself. Past, current and upcoming series include travel docuseries, cooking shows, a gardening show, a fishing show, a show about disabled entrepreneurs, a docuseries about disabled entertainers, a docuseries featuring a vision impaired psychic, and an Amazing Race-style competition show. AMI is also moving decisively into the kids' space ("If you're thinking about reshaping views and attitudes toward disability, let's get them while they're young, right?" says Nye) and into scripted series.

"We're really looking at anything that anybody wants to consume," says Nye.

And how does AMI know what viewers want to consume? A research panel of more than 300 participants, all members of the disability community, is one major way. Every year, the panel participates in a program monitor, reviewing synopses of series to help the broadcaster gauge what types of shows its audience is interested in. AMI also does "deep dives" on its on-air series, in which it asks the panel "questions about characters, about plot lines, where they'd like to see the series go. Is it resonating with them? What do they want to see more of? Less of?" explains Nye.

No doubt, AMI is finely attuned to its audience—and hungry for fresh content. That makes the broadcaster particularly open to partnering with producers, disabled or not, to create the kinds of series its viewers want to watch.

When choosing who to work with, AMI has one overarching requirement. AMI's producer partners must be prepared to centre the disability community through storytelling, hiring practices, and the production process itself.

"If you're pitching us a show, the most important thing is that it's guided by the disability community," says Nye. "It doesn't mean that you, as a producer, have to have a disability yourself. But you really should be engaging with the community in roles that control that narrative: writers, producers, directors, editors."

René Brar is head of development at BC's Big Time Decent Productions, whose first scripted series recently got the green light from AMI. Adapting is a coming-of-age half-hour dramedy about a girl with cerebral palsy, determined to lose her virginity before winding up in a wheelchair. Brar affirms the importance of having "the right folks tell the story"—in this case, creator Rachael Ransom, whose real-life experience with cerebral palsy guides the script. Having a disabled individual helm the show

does much more than check a box; it ensures that the show is "authentic, stronger, more genuine," says Nye.

"We loved that the script for Adapting connected to universal themes: of acceptance, of family, of friendship, of getting laid in high school," says Brar. "But Rachael was able to do it by telling a very, very specific story that I don't have access to."

This universal-in-the-specific quality applies equally well to Big Time Decent's unscripted series *Underdog Inc.*, which AMI has renewed for a second season. *Underdog Inc.* is the company's latest entry in the ever-popular trucker docuseries category. The show follows Dale Kristensen, a daring "hotshot trucker" who first appeared on Global in Backroad Truckers (also produced by Big Time Decent)—and who happens to be a little person.

shows in which "you just root for the little guy and all the disabled characters are saintly. Avoiding that is really important for us, and I believe for AMI as well."

Apart from inclusive storytelling, AMI also stresses the importance of including—and accommodating—disabled individuals on set, whether they're members of the cast or crew. "To work with us, it's essential to have a really robust DEI plan. How are you going to engage employees from the disability community?" says Nye.

According to her, 55 per cent of the cast and crew of the buddy docuseries Crip Trip (Catapult Pictures) identify as having a disability. For the news parody series *The Squeaky Wheel:* Canada (Hitsby Entertainment), 100 per cent of the creative team are disabled. "Those are

ducers that we like to work with are the ones who are willing to understand what it takes to work with people with disabilities, engaging them and asking the questions early on."

For Black Rhino Creative, the prodco behind AMI's multisensory travel series *Postcards From...*, that means strict eight-hour days during production. It means ensuring that series host Christa Couture, who is an amputee, feels comfortable on screen and has her needs met on set ("Like you would with any talent, but we're just dialled in that much more," says director/producer Ryan Mah).

It also means training directors and producers in the use of integrated described video (IDV), a method of producing content for visually impaired audiences. In contrast to described video—which tacks on an audio track to relate what's happening on screen—IDV bakes accessibility into the production, with the show's host or a cast member describing what's happening

Nye explains it this way: "With described video, a third voice comes in to say, for example, 'Cara puts on her reading glasses.' With IDV, I might say, 'Oh, I can't read a thing without these." Mah describes the method as "producing every episode like it's going to be on the radio."

AMI pioneered IDV, and it's just one more way the broadcaster prioritizes its audience. "Described video is great, but Both shows steer clear of what Brar calls "inspiration porn," it can be quite annoying to people who don't require it," says Nye. "We've actually heard from people that they'll watch the same show in different rooms because their spouse or child

> doesn't want to hear that description. Not a very inclusive experience." IDV, on the other hand, is seamless, and makes content accessible to everybody.

"The feedback has been phenomenal," says Nye. "We've been impressed with how our producer partners have stepped up to incorporate IDV into their productions. Black Rhino, for example, can just do it with their eyes closed."

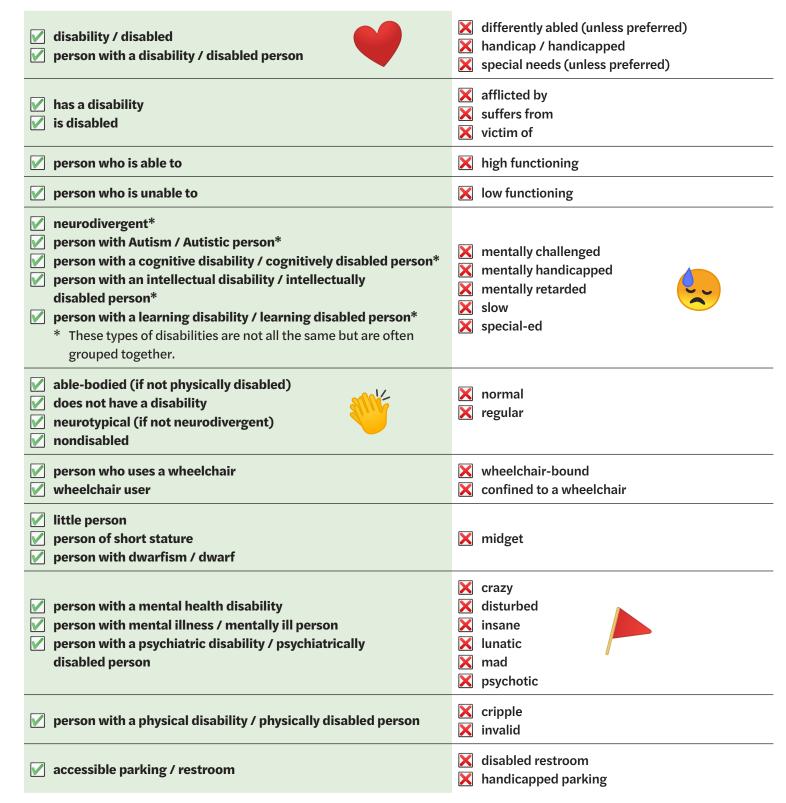
"We're even hearing of producers who are starting to do that in their other productions, too," Nye adds. "Because why not?"

For his part, Brar of Big Time Decent calls AMI "a dream" to work with: "They're willing to find strong partners and trust their judg-

very high bars," says Nye, but it's not just about stats: "The proment." Mah of Black Rhino concurs: "They're amazing. They're very passionate about making sure the content is accessible for everyone."

> AMI's focus on accessibility is simply a focus on audience, and it's an audience no other broadcaster can claim to cater to in the same way. Nye is grateful for the partners who help deliver the content that audience craves.

can't get enough of shows featuring regular people who roll up their sleeves and get to work.

Blame an overly rich diet of prestige, high-concept TV. Blame the pandemic, which revealed to us the vulnerability of supply chains, and how little we know about how our system actually works. Blame anxiety around AI and our longing for a simpler time.

Whatever the cause, viewers are flocking to documentary series featuring risky, high-stakes work, like Northern Air Rescue, East Harbour Heroes and Highway Thru Hell (which has been renewed for a 15th season!). Scripted comedies about blue-collar workers—The Trades and The Office Movers—are gaining traction. And maybe you've heard of Farming for Love, a dating show for, yep, farmers.



Justin Stockman, VP of content development and programming at Bell Media certainly understands the appeal of these shows, once joking on a conference panel that if it has a truck, it'll find an audience. Bell Media is leaning into this with original series such as The Trades, The Office Movers, Farming for Love and Highway Thru Hell, among others. "The characters and real-life figures resonate with Canadian audiences, reflecting viewers' own experiences and making it easy to connect with the stories," he says. "Our focus remains on creating original content with humour and heart, content that allows Canadians to see themselves represented and fosters that important and valuable emotional connection."

Despite their differences in genre and tone, these workplace shows have at least two characteristics in common. One: they're undeniably authentic, firmly grounded in real life. Two: they have a great big heart.

But the show is just as interested in showing the diversity of Canada's agricultural industry. That diversity was illustrated in the farmers' race, sexual orientation, and the type of farming they do: dairy farming, agritourism, winemaking and more.

Says Antonucci, "I think and I hope we helped reframe perceptions of who our farmers are and what they do. At the end of the day, these are the people that bring us our food, our beer, our bread all these things. It's cool to shine a light on that."

If Farming for Love gives viewers a glimpse of the essential work that farmers do, docuseries offer a front-row seat to types of work that are just as essential, but even more hazardous.

East Harbour Heroes (on Crave) follows the workers who "make a living on the edge of the world," on the coast of Newfoundland, particularly in St. John's Harbour. "The show is really a look at the everyday heroes that keep communities running," says Nicole Hamilton, the show's executive producer and EVP of unscripted content at Attraction.

She defines "everyday heroes" as people whose jobs are nearly invisible to us, but are entirely vital to how we live. The allure of the series—which features stevedores, commercial fishers, tugboat operators and more—lies in both the difficulty of the work and in the characters who do it.





"Mother Nature has her own will and makes things extra challenging," says Hamilton. Sea ice, hurricane season, winter storms: the show's cast (not to mention its crew) must contend with all of these things to keep goods moving in and out of the harbour. Even if viewers aren't ultimately inspired to take up commercial fishing off the coast of Newfoundland, they're happy to watch from a distance.

"Watching these people in conflict with Mother Nature—it's a powerful battle," says Hamilton.

As is so often the case with docuseries like this one, audiences come for the action and stay for the characters. "The people who do these jobs are so amazing," says Hamilton. "And Newfoundlanders are so funny. Salt-of-the-earth people. It's such a special place."

East Harbour Heroes



East Harbour Heroes is also a story of building local production capacity in Newfoundland. By season three, a full 90 per cent of the crew was local. One of the local camera operators, who started as an assistant, is now the director of photography (DP). Success stories like these have helped the local community embrace the show, which spotlights their often-overlooked livelihoods.

"We're dependent on a certain pool of people to keep our lives running," says Hamilton. "They're the backbone of our lives, and we don't always see it. To shine a light on them is incredibly satisfying."

BC-based prodco Great Pacific Media has made an art of shining a light on invisible, rugged, risky work. The company is the proud creator of shows like Timber Titans (logging), High Arctic Haulers (northern cargo shipping), Rocky Mountain Wreckers (heavy towing in the US Rockies), Heavy Rescue: 401 (heavy towing in Ontario) and, of course, the original heavy-towing docuseries: Highway Thru Hell.

The long-running series covers heavy-vehicle rescue and recovery-towing operations on the treacherous Coquihalla Highway in the BC interior. As in East Harbour Heroes, the cast of Highway Thru Hell must grapple with Mother Nature's worst—in this case, ice storms, mudslides and avalanches—to rescue semis, buses, and other vehicles too large to be towed in the regular way. The show is wrapping up its 14th season of production. It's a "very, very, very, very wellloved series" in the 180 territories in which it's shown, says David Way, CEO of Great Pacific Media.

Clearly, it's not just truck drivers and towtruck operators who are watching (though heavy machinery is certainly part of the appeal). "We have a pretty core audience, but we get notes from grandmothers and grandkids. It's multigenerational now," says Way.

The most common response Way hears? "I had no idea that people were doing this kind of work and how important it is." And here's that word "backbone" again: "Audiences around the world marvel at the people who do this job. They're the backbone of what it takes to make a country work, by keeping highways safe and open for everybody to do what they need to do."

According to Way, safety is number one on set. "We're not in there, chasing the action with a camera running. No, we ask: Is this safe? Can we do this? And if we can't, we don't," he says.

And he insists that, while the team at Great Pacific certainly wants audiences to be entertained, "we don't make stuff up on this show." Why bother? The drama is already built in.

Another show that doesn't make stuff up is Northern Air Rescue, APTN's docuseries about Missinippi Airways, an Indigenous-owned airline operating out of Mathias Colomb First Nation in northern Manitoba. The airline performs rescue, passenger and cargo services to fly-in communi- Paquette. The crew deals with temties in the province.

"Northern Air Rescue highlights the remarkable stories of ordinary people who go the extra mile to serve the North," says Adam Garnet Jones, director of TV content and special events at APTN. "We believe people connect with these stories because they see reflections of themselves and their loved ones in the commitment of the Missinippi Airways team."

The show's origin story illustrates how popunity, is well worth it. The show gives lar series like these are becoming with producers. Ultimately, RealWorld won the day and committed to making the show in the way the airline wanted: as "a true factual series that really doesn't play with the narrative," says Paquette. "It's straight up about these people and the good work they do." APTN quickly signed on, and the series is currently in production on season two, which will release in early 2026.

The show captures the life-or-death necessity of an airline like Missinippi, for medical emergencies, the transport of goods, and evacuations during wildfire season. "There's only one way in and one way out," says Paquette. The pilots also perform tasks southerners wouldn't even think

Beyond the ever-present threat of bears, with real-life shows comes real-life weather. This has been one of the greatest challenges for the crew. "In northern Manitoba, inclement weather is just a reality," says peratures from -32° to plus 32°, and the notorious swarms of bugs in the summer. "It's hard to get a steady shot when you see horseflies taking a piece of your skin out," he says.

But the weather, as well as the time it's taken to build relationships and create trust with the commupeople who never have—and probably never will—set foot in a fly-in Manitoba community a deeper sense of what life and work in the North is like. And it gives the airline employchance to share their life and work with others.

"They have a story to tell, and they're proud to share it," says Paquette. "It's been an honour and a privilege to work with them. If we can capture a bit of the beauty and allow people to see a bit of the essence of life in the North, that would be fantastic."

"IT'S AN UNDERSERVED DEMOGRAPHIC, SO THERE WAS DEFINITELY A NEED"

A scripted single-cam comedy about oil refinery workers sounds as distant as can be from a docuseries about pilots doing essential work in remote Manitoba. But The Trades (airing on Crave) is also rooted in reality. And while, according to its creator, it's "ridiculous" and "crass" it's co-produced with the Trailer Park Boys—it's got heart to spare.

Creator Ryan Lindsay (Kontent House Productions) based the series on his own experiences growing up

in Sarnia, Ontario, a city "propped up by oil refineries," he says. His younger brother, Tyson, is a pipefitter. His youngest brother, Kellan, is a carpenter. When Lindsay moved to Toronto to work in the film industry, he'd come home with what he thought were great stories, "working with the Guillermo del Toros, the David Cronenbergs. But my stories always got trumped by my brothers' misadventures and workplace antics."

He brought on his brothers as consultants for the show, and also got to work interviewing hundreds of tradespeople. He wanted to learn the local jargon, the juiciest workplace stories, the funniest nicknames.

"A lot of the show is based off of real things that have actually been said and done," says Lindsay.

It's those tradespeople that he makes the show for, though of course it has the ability to resonate with anyone who's had a quirky colleague.

"Blue-collar individuals account for a third of our population globally, and they consume a large quantity of content," says Lindsay. "It's an underserved demographic, so there was definitely a need. But regardless of demographic, it's those relationships within a work family that provide the humour and drama and heart."

While the show is a comedy, it also addresses important workplace issues, such as women's representation in the trades. One female character, Audrey, pursues a career as a carpenter, and the show follows her trajectory from orientation to apprenticeship and beyond.

Again, while undoubtedly a comedy first, Lindsay asserts that the characters it portrays "are the unsung heroes, the individuals that keep our lights on and our water running." He wants to make content that showcases pipefitters and welders and boilermakers—but what he really wants to do is make them laugh. "There are unlimited options for content, but why shouldn't they watch a show that gives them a bit of ownership?" he says.

The Office Movers, also on Crave, is another blue-collar comedy, this time about a mishapplagued office moving company run by two brothers (played by creators Jae and Trey Richards). It's based on their real-life experiences working for their father, and their unglamorous, just-getthrough-the-day anecdotes provide plenty of laughs, as well as all-too-real situations that many can relate to.

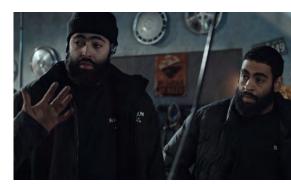
"Everett [played by Jae Richards] is trying to run a company with everything stacked against him," says Dan Bennett, of Counterfeit Pictures. "He's trying to do right by his people and by his clients,

but it's like trying to catch sand. It all slips through his fingers. I think people can relate to that: you just try to do your best and you live to fight another day."

According to Bennett, a show like The Office Movers, which films in warehouses and on loading docks, plays to the Canadian industry's creative strengths—and production limitations. "Our budgets are getting smaller in Canada," he says. "I can't get a budget to make Succession. So what are the stories we can tell within the parameters we have?"

"Grounded, real, everyday shows: these are things that Canadian pro-something a little more real." ducers excel at," he continues. "We need to continue to look for opportunities in those worlds, because they're our strong suit."

They're also audience favourites. Whether they're lonely farmers, brave captains or hapless office movers, viewers want to see shows featuring people who

Lisa Clarkson: I met Tracey, I believe, at Prime Time [CMPA's yearly media conference in 2022. It was Liz who said to me, "You need to meet Tracey Friesen." And we immediately connected. We sat at one of those round tables in the hall and compared notes. And we agreed that the CMPA would partner with the CBC around a green storytelling workshop-type thing. That was in February. We launched the workshops in April. They happened in June. I'd say the truest Elisa Suppa: I met Tracey just a few years back, when Teleaspect of Tracey was that she was exceptional at action

Marsha Newbery: I think I must have met Tracey in the early 2000s, when I was starting out as a baby producer and she was at the NFB. I had a couple of small projects with the NFB, and then it was just one of those things: you're in the community, you see each other all the time. But I really got to know her when I worked at the CMPA and she came on. I worked very closely with her for two or three years at the CMPA. We continued working together, specifically on sustainability, when I took on a sustainability job at Thunderbird and then launched Producing for the Planet.

Liz, you were Tracey's supervisor at the CMPA. How did she shape sustainability initiatives there?

Liz Shorten: Tracey was the perfect person for this file, because of her passion and her experience. As folks have already said, Tracey was a connector. She also was somebody who believed in action, and she did that through collaboration. And amazing things happened over the course of a couple of years because she just took charge.

A number of years ago, the CMPA board of directors decided to create a sustainability and climate action committee. This was big. It signalled that the board was going to make sustainability a priority. And it became Tracey's thing. Each CMPA committee has a staff lead, and Tracey was that staff lead. And the work of the committee, the budget, everything—it was her creation. And the committee has supported all of the CMPA's work to date on the climate file.

The rest of you, how did Tracey inspire the sustainability work you did within your respective organizations?

Lisa Clarkson: I will tell you: I'm old. And I have never encountered such a challenging initiative as sustainability in our industry. There is such a wide variety of attitudes and approaches, and sometimes resistance. It's actually very, very, very hard to get things done.

How did Tracey inspire me? Right from the minute that we connected all we talked about was what was possible. Not what made it impossible, but what was possible. All of her work—green storytelling, innovative work on environmental sustainability, costing—all was done with a possibilist perspective. Not "No, this can't be done," but "Here's how it

In this work, there are so many people who are so ready to say no. But so many projects—whether or not she was involved in them directly—she just made me think that they were possible. And I'm sure that was part of the reason I thought that I could pull off Canadian Broadcasters for Sustainability [a coalition of broadcasters committed to sustainable change and start Green Frame a coalition of Crown corporations, federally funded organizations and CRTC-mandated funds committed to increasing sustainability in the industry]. She gave me the confidence to say, "Well, maybe collaboration will work."

Marsha Newbery: When I was at the CMPA, we were just coming out of COVID, we were having heat domes and wildfire season in Vancouver, and I said to her, "I really want to get more into sustainability." And she supported me taking some training, and she championed me to get into sustainability even more. I don't think I would even be on this path without her support. That was a good boss moment.

And she was also the first person I called when I was thinking about setting up Producing for the Planet [a non-profit that formalizes independent Canadian producers' commitments to climate action]. I asked her, "What do you think of this crazy idea?" And I'm not going to lie, she asked some very challenging questions. But it was all to make sure there was a real chance of success. I knew she would tell me it was crazy, and then we would work it out, and she would have my back. That was my experience of her.

A lasting **impact** 💸

Over her decades-long career, Tracey Friesen performed many different roles, from executive producer at the NFB to director of communications and engagement at the David Suzuki Foundation. But a role she particularly cherished was founder of Story Money Impact (SMI), a non-profit that assists documentary filmmakers in their efforts to spark social and environmental change through their films. This organization carried on the work Tracey began in her 2016 book Story Money Impact: Funding Media for Social Change. Following Tracey's passing, SMI announced the creation of the Tracey Friesen Impact Fund, which will provide financial support to social and environmental justice projects and their makers. Such a fund had long been a dream of Tracey's, and will be an enduring testament to her belief in storytelling's power. To learn more and to donate to the fund, please visit storymoneyimpact.com.

Anne-Valérie Tremblay: I remember, after one of the conversations that we had, I realized that Tracey was not only in charge of sustainability, like I was: in her case, her whole person was about sustainability. And I thought, "Well, Anne-Valérie, now you have to step up, because Tracey is not only in charge of sustainability, she's living it." She inspired me to embrace the values, because she embodied them.

Elisa Suppa: One small example of Tracey's influence: when Telefilm launched our sustainability budget template, as soon as Tracey got wind of it, she said, "How can we get it into the hands of our producers?" So she quickly organized and recorded these training sessions. She always wanted to get the information out to help other storytellers.

And what I saw in our meetings was that she raised the comfort level, even when there wasn't comfort to begin with. When she first started the "sirens meetings," as we eventually called them, I thought, "What's this going to be?" And then you realize that she was really creating—I think we all felt it—just a very safe space to say what we thought.

Can you share more about "the sirens"-the informal sustainability working group that Tracey created? What was her intention with that group?

Lisa Clarkson: It was all her. Initially, I was honestly skeptical about it. I thought, "Who needs another meeting? No, thanks." But I did it because it was Tracey, and she saw the possibility, so I wanted to see the possibility, too. She wanted to gather people that she believed to be influencers in the sustainability space, so that we could hack through some of those really matter how hard it is. You have to keep fighting. Just never difficult sustainability challenges and problem solve.

And I have to say it was massively effective to share

unvarnished thoughts and get unvarnished feedback. There are so few places in our industry to do that.

Elisa Suppa: At first when she called the group the sirens, I think we all laughed, because of the mythological connotations. But once I understood the vision she had, it made sense. It became clear that she was putting together a sort of tiny think tank—what she called "watchers for the future." Where do we need to go? How can we bring others along?

Anne-Valérie Tremblay: Yes, and "sirens" also has this double connotation, both of mythology and of sounding an alarm. And every time I would tell my colleagues, "I have a meeting with the sirens," they would start laughing. But it was such a

What do you feel Tracey has left you with as you continue the fight? What of her legacy would you want others to

Elisa Suppa: It's hard to think of just one thing to say. If producers or storytellers can do even one thing, any step, however small, is important. And eventually the tide will change. She made it clear that nothing was too small or too big.

Marsha Newbery: Working in sustainability can be very hard. And, near the end of our time together, Tracey expressed some of that hardness that she was feeling. And the last conversation I had with her, where she knew it was probably the last time we were going to be talking, she just said, "It doesn't give up. Never give up. Never give up."

And that is the piece of Tracey I carry with me every day.

Green machine

A new zero-emission hydrogen generator promises to help producers and crews breathe easy

Over his three decades in the film industry, one thing always bothered David Hardy: diesel generators.

"The pollution is gross. It's killing us. There's got to be a better way," Hardy says of the loud, emission-spewing generators traditionally used by film crews to power equipment when shooting on location.

Seven years ago, Hardy—a former VP at equipment-rental giant William F. White—got serious about finding a better way. He teamed up with a group of engineers working in the hydrogen space to explore new eco-friendly power solutions.

After a years-long development process "that's been a little bit more of a journey than we expected," Hardy and his company, Hone, have a brand-new, zero-emission hydrogen generator ready to be put to work on Canada's film and TV sets. It's powered by an internal combustion engine, and costs roughly as much as a diesel generator. It burns "100 per cent clean," says Hardy, with no carbon dioxide emissions.

Hone's generator looks and operates much like the diesel generators film crews are used to. "The power output is the same. The connections on the interface look the same," says Hardy. One significant difference is that each generator is connected to a fuel block trailer with a flexible hose. The trailers carry cylinders

filled with hydrogen gas. When the generator isn't running or is being moved, it has zero fuel in it, reducing the risk of longer than most diesel generators. spills or fires.

These are all marks in the generator's favour. Another one: apart from the internal combustion engine, which comes from Germany, the generator is a Canadian-made product. What

could prevent the screen industry from adopting this technology on a large scale?

Hardy believes the greatest obstacle will be the price of hydrogen gas (measured in kilograms) compared to diesel fuel (measured in litres), and educating people on what that actually means for their budget. Hydrogen costs \$15 to \$20 a kilogram, and one fuel block trailer carries up to 130 kilograms. While that total might seem steep compared to diesel, Hardy points out that one trailer can keep



the generator running for two days of filming—considerably

He also believes the price will drop as soon as more hydrogen producers enter the ring. "Like any new technology, when it comes in, it's usually a little more expensive, until it scales to a point where it kind of crosses over with the incumbent,"

> says Hardy. "We expect that to happen within a couple of years. We're confident that soon, nobody will think, 'Oh, that's more expensive than diesel,' because it won't be."

According to Hardy, it's high time this kind of technology joined the mainstream: "The ability to show up on set, plop your generator on base camp, and not have to worry about the crew and the talent and the kids on set breathing all this crap—it's an idea whose time has come, and we hope the industry feels the same way."

Monetization strategies to elevate your YouTube Channel

YouTube channel producers, distributors and content creators have become a powerful industry, generating millions in advertising sales globally and driving meaningful revenue. However, many undervalue their channel by failing to properly monetize their content on YouTube.

When it comes to monetizing video, YouTube has fewer restrictions than other streaming platforms. Currently, every video uploaded to YouTube automatically undergoes an ad suitability review according to YouTube's guidelines, and creators

receive a green, yellow or red dollar-sign icon to indicate influence revenue include views, which indicate how many whether their content is eligible for all, some or no ads.

It's important to understand the distinction between You-Tube video views and ad views when thinking about potential earnings. The first thing to understand is how YouTube's payment system operates. YouTube pays channel owners through its Partner Program. This program enables creators to monetize their content by sharing revenue from ads displayed on their videos.

The eligibility criteria for fan funding and the eligibility for monetization with advertisements is different. Fan funding is a feature that allows viewers to make voluntary donations to support their favourite channels. For access to fan-funding features such as Super Thanks and memberships, a channel must meet the following requirements: 500 subscribers, three public uploads within the last 90 days, and either 3,000 public watch hours in the past 12 months or 3 million Shorts

views in the past 90 days. For full monetization, including advertisements and fan funding, the criteria are 1,000 subscribers and either 4,000 public watch hours in the past 12 months or 10 million Shorts views in the past 90 days.

Let's explore actionable strategies and YouTube monetization best practices that channel owners and content creators can use to turn the tide in their favour.

There are automated systems (such as Aux Mode's) that simplify the revenue reporting process on streaming platforms, offering clear and concise monthly reports by region. This eliminates the need for manual tracking and spreadsheets, providing a straightforward overview of revenue generated in regions where you own the intellectual property.

Understanding YouTube's monetization measurement is crucial, although predicting the exact earnings per view is challenging due to the platform's complex algorithm. Key metrics that

influence revenue include views, which indicate how many times a video is seen (distinguishing between Premium and other users); watch time, which measures the total minutes a video is watched across a channel; specific videos; and playbacks. Furthermore, user engagement—including comments, likes, subscribers, shares, lost subscribers, dislikes, and additions to playlists and favourites—also plays a vital role.

In addition to these core metrics, YouTube's monetization system also considers playlists, annotations, end screens, live streams, audience retention, channel memberships, estimated revenue and ad performance when determining the channel's health.

YouTube is truly a complete ecosystem designed to help creators grow, monetize and build sustainable, long-term businesses around their content. The platform has evolved into a monetization machine, offering a wide range of features from shorts and shopping functionalities to channel memberships and premium ad formats. These tools provide diverse avenues for creators to generate revenue and engage with their audience in meaningful ways.

Best practices for

optimizing content on YouTube

The guidelines below outline key areas to enhance visibility, engagement and monetization for your video content.

Optimize metadata and thumbnails

Enhance discoverability and clickthrough rates by using clear titles, detailed descriptions, relevant tags and high-quality, customdesigned thumbnails.

Promote across channels

Expand reach through crosspromotion on social media platforms, encouraging cast and crew amplification and collaborating with influencers or fan channels.

Al dubs and global reach

Provide accurate subtitles and closed captions, consider multi-language channels for global content, and carefully manage territory controls in line with licensing agreements.

Engagement and community

Foster a strong community by engaging with comments, utilizing the Community tab for updates and polls, considering livestream events, and moderating comment sections to maintain a brand-safe environment.

Content strategy and programming

Diversify content formats to include full episodes, clips, behind-the-scenes footage and more. Maintain a consistent upload schedule and organize videos into playlists for improved navigation and watch time.

Protect your brand

Regularly monitor for trademark and copyright infringement, report fake channels, and ensure consistent use of branding assets like logos and watermarks.

Leverage YouTube features

Utilize features like YouTube
Shorts for promotion, premieres
to build anticipation, end screens
and cards to drive further views,
and YouTube Analytics for ongoing
performance improvement.

Monetization and rights management

Leverage YouTube's Content ID to automatically detect and monetize your content. Explore various monetization options such as ads, channel memberships and a merch shelf. Implement global rights management and strategically claim user uploads.

Experiment and iterate

Continuously test new formats, thumbnails and video lengths.
Use A/B testing tools to compare divergent tactics, and learn from analytics such as watch time, retention and click-through rates to refine your strategy.

Mentorship master

Having run the CMPA's mentorship program for over 20 years, Sarolta Csete knows a thing or two about the importance of fit

Sarolta Csete is director of mentorship and international development at the CMPA. She's managed the CMPA National Mentorship Program since her first day on the job, more than 20 years ago. According to her, the success of the program rests on matching both the skill sets and the personalities of the participating producers.

"We have a pretty good formula," she says. That formula includes responsiveness to the changing needs of the industry. Csete points out that the National Mentorship Program was one of the first to offer a program for disabled producers, nearly 20 years ago. Since then, it's added programs for aspiring Indigenous producers, Black producers, producers from particular regions and more.

One of Csete's favourite things about her job is watching the career trajectory of mentees: "It's always inspiring to see people start from something like producer's assistant to being on the CMPA board. And it's a proud moment when you recognize names of people who've come through the program in *Playback* or during awards season."

Of course, before mentees can go on to win awards, they first need to find their mentor match. Mentors and mentees apply to the program together, and Csete is adamant that mentees should never settle.

"It needs to be a good fit, because if you don't like the person you're working with, six months can be very long," she says. Goals should be aligned, and there should be a clear outline of what each party hopes to accomplish during the mentorship.

"Do your research and find a company that creates the kind of content you're passionate about," she urges. "Find the producers you look up to and persuade them that you're worth taking a chance on."

To that end, prospective mentees might mention the benefit of adding an employee who's eager to succeed: "For small compa-

nies with maybe one or two employees,

adding another person can really make a huge difference in terms of the capacity of that company and what they are able to accomplish."

And who knows: the mentorship may just stretch into a decades-long working relationship—something else that Csete knows a lot about.

The CMPA hosted a reception to help Ontario and BC producers connect further, and a consultant met individually with each producer to give feedback on their strategies, goals and pitches.

BERLIN

FEBRUARY 2025

The annual eight-day European Film Market, held in conjunction with the Berlinale, brings together film and media producers, buyers, sales agents, distributors and financiers to network, do business and explore new opportunities. The CMPA sponsored five member companies to attend the festival and conference, where they joined hundreds of Canadians from all over the country who were in attendance.



COPENHAGEN

MARCH 2025

International cooperation is particularly common—and advantageous—in the documentary space. To keep the collaborative juices flowing, the CMPA took eight documentary producers to the Copenhagen International Documentary Festival (CPH:DOX) in Denmark, where they participated in roundtables, networking events and mentorship programs and strengthened their ties with potential collaborators from 20 delegations of producers from around the globe.
